IN THE POLICE COURT.



BAPTIST CON- VENTION IS DOWN TO BUSINESS

Reports Adopted and Committees Appointed at This Morning's Session
---List of Deaths During The Past Year

The fourth session of the Maritime United Baptist Convention was held this morning in the main auditorium of the Brunswick Street Baptist church with Mr. J. A. Christie of Amherst, N.S., the first vice-president elect, in the chair.

Rev. Dr. J. A. Francis of Boston, conducted the devotional exercises, after which the second report of the nominating committee was received and adopted as follows:

Committee on Obituaries—Dr. E. Crowell, Dr. W. E. McIntyre, Rev. A. T. Dykeman, Dr. A. Chipman and Rev. J. B. Ganong.

Committee of State of Denomination—Rev. R. Osgood Morse, Rev. R. J. Colpitts, Rev. C. R. Freeman and Rev. I. A. Corbitt.

Delegate to Social Service Council—Rev. W. F. Parker.

Representative on Board of Governors of European Baptist College—Dr. J. B. Cutten.

To preach the Convention sermon in 1915—Rev. A. F. Newcomer, alternate Rev. F. C. Hartley.

The convention then received the report of Acadia University, which was submitted by Rev. I. B. Oakes. After considerable discussion it was adopted with a few corrections.

Dr. A. Cohoun presented the report of the treasurer of Acadia University which was adopted.

Rev. G. A. Lawson, secretary-treasurer of the Baptist Annuity Board, submitted the general report of the Ministers' Relief and Annuity Funds.

COMMITTEE ON PATRIOTIC FUND HELD MEETING

Report of Delegation Which Interviewed the Provincial Government-- Supplies for Belgians to be Forwarded at Once

Considerable business of importance was transacted at Saturday evening's meeting of the relief committee of the local branch of the Canadian Patriotic Fund. Mayor Mitchell presided and the others present were: Judge Crockett, Judge Wilson, Judge Barry, Dr. T. C. Allen, Lt. Colonel T. G. Loggie, Mr. A. R. Slipp, M. P., Mr. J. J. McCaffrey and Mr. James S. Neill.

On behalf of the committee appointed to interview the Provincial Government, Mr. Slipp reported that the government had decided to furnish a ship for the purpose of forwarding the contributions of produce, clothing etc., for the Belgian sufferers to Belgium. He also stated the I.C. R. and C. P. R. had agreed to give free transportation on all goods, for the Belgians, over their railways to the port of shipment.

Judge Wilson reported that the County Council had met and decided to hold meetings throughout the county in the interest of the funds and that committees have been appointed in the parishes to solicit subscriptions.

On motion of Lt. Col. Loggie, seconded by Dr. Allen, Mr. J. J. McCaffrey was authorized to secure a car for the transportation of contributions for the Belgians and to employ assistants to load same.

Sheriff W. T. Howe's offer to allow the committee the free use of his office in the County Court house was accepted and in the future it will be used as the headquarters for receiving applications for assistance.
