WILLIAM LOCKHART FOUND DEAD IN BED ON SUNDAY

Sudden Death of a Well Known Citizen--Was a Veteran of the Fenian Raid--Had Been in Poor Health For Some Time

Mr. William Lockhart, a well known and highly respected citizen, was found dead in bed yesterday morning at the home of his son, Mr. George F. Lockhart, 756 Charlotte street, having succumbed to an attack of heart failure.

Although the deceased had been in failing health for some time past, he was able to be about the city on Saturday afternoon and the news of his sudden death yesterday came as a shock to his many friends and acquaintances. He was a Fenian Raid veteran and a prominent member of Hiram Lodge, No. 6, Free and Accepted Masons.

The late Mr. Lockhart was seventy-six years of age and was formerly engaged in the painting business. He is survived by four daughters, Mrs. C. W. Fletcher, Mrs. T. C. Thell, Mrs. C. Wheeler and Miss Margaret Lockhart, all of Boston, and four sons, George F. of this city, Samuel, in the west, John A. and William F. G. of Boston. One sister, Mrs. John McLaughlin of this city, and one brother, George of Boston, also survive. The funeral will be held tomorrow afternoon, under the auspices of Hiram Lodge, No. 6, F. and A. M., and will leave the house at three o'clock. Rev. Dr. Smith, pastor of St. Paul's Presbyterian church, will conduct the services and interment will be made at the Old Burial Ground.

DAUGHTERS OF EMPIRE SENDS GOODS TO SOLDIER BOYS

Large Quantity of Socks, Caps, Wristlets, Newspapers, Etc., Going Forward to Salisbury Plains--Successful Meeting at Pokiok

The first consignment of comforts for the local soldier boys who have gone to the front with the Canadian expeditionary force to be sent forward since the troops left Canada is being shipped to Salisbury Plains, England this afternoon by the Daughters of the Empire.

Contributions for the soldier boys have been received from all parts of the province and the consignment will consist of two hundred pairs of heavy knitted socks, one hundred caps, forty wristlets, forty belts and a large number of copies of New Brunswick newspapers.

A very successful meeting in the interests of the Belgian sufferers was held at Pokiok last evening. Judge Wilson was the principal speaker and at the close of his address there was a pie social, which netted the sum of \$68.50. A correspondent sends the following account of the meeting:

He introduced the speaker of the evening, Judge Wilson of Fredericton, who gave a very interesting address on the causes and effects of the present European war and closed with an appeal for the people of Belgium, who have fought so bravely for freedom's cause and in consequence are now suffering for food, shelter and clothing.

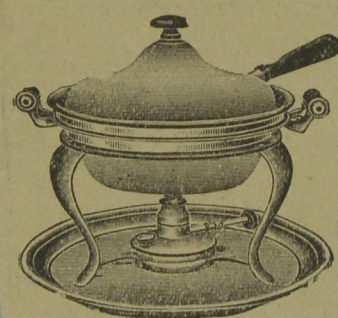

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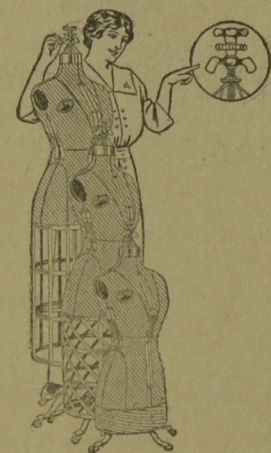
