quite safe if you tell him to say nothing about it.

Court adjourned until 2.30 o'clock.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Mr. Seely resumed the stand at the  
opening of the afternoon session and  
Mr. Mullin continued his examina-  
tion.

Q.—Did you ever subscribe any  
money for stock?

A.—There was no call made.

Q.—Answer the question.

A.—No, I didn't.

Mr. Mullin read a communication  
from Mr. Gould to Mr. Seely, dated  
December 21, in which the former  
said he would give Mr. Seely a  
note for \$4,000 with right of renewal.  
He said, however, that he should not  
be held personally responsible for  
the note, but added that he would  
pay it at the earliest opportunity.  
First he would have to secure per-  
mission from the directors but he felt  
that all were agreeable excepting  
Mr. McDonnell.

Mr. Mullin referred to another letter  
from Mr. Gould to the witness  
enclosing a four months' note for  
\$4,000. The letter read that if any-  
thing should happen that all would  
be driven out and nothing made, he  
could not be expected to pay the  
note. "There is a large risk in these  
big undertakings and there is a pos-  
sibility that nothing will be made,  
especially where one has to depend  
upon a few politicians and they, as  
a rule, are a mighty poor depend-  
ence." Mr. Gould in the letter said  
that he himself had sunk money in  
the undertaking and had yet received  
nothing in return.

"If I get nothing it will be im-  
possible for me to get some for you"  
he wrote.

Mr. Mullin—Did you not tell Mr.  
Gould that the \$12,000 note was on  
discount in the bank?

A.—I have advice that you would  
call it that.

Cross-examined by Dr. Wallace:  
Q.—Did you pay any money for  
your stock?

A.—No.

Q.—Did you give any value?

A.—I spent two years' work and  
\$2,200 or \$2,500, more than anyone  
else in the company, I think, except-  
ing Mr. Gould.

The jury was dismissed by His  
Honor after the taking of evidence  
had finished, and Mr. Wallace entered  
upon the presentation of the legal  
points of the case on behalf of the  
plaintiff. He gave references for his  
contentions. When he had finished  
Mr. Mullin said he would defer pre-  
senting the points of his case for the  
defence until the next morning.  
Court then adjourned.

## POPULATION OF U. S. NINETY EIGHT MILLIONS

Washington, April 27—Continental  
United States now has a population of  
more than 98,000,000 while the coun-  
try, with its possessions, is peopled  
with more than 100,000,000 persons.  
The census bureau announced today.  
Census experts have calculated that  
the population of continental United  
States on July 1, 1914, will be  
98,871,324 against 91,972,266 on April  
15, 1910, when the last census was  
taken. For the United States and its  
possessions they estimate that the  
population this July will be 109,-  
021,992, compared with 101,748,269  
in 1910.
