## MEXICAN ELECTIONS TO BE HELD SOON

Mexico City, July 4—Minister of  
Interior Alcocer announced today  
that a successor to President Huerta  
would be elected on Sunday. He  
stated that all arrangements for an  
election in the territory controlled  
by the government had been completed  
and that Pedro Lascurain and  
General Velasco, who defended Tor-  
reon against General Villa, would be  
the only candidates.

Alcocer stated that General Huerta  
would not be a candidate. Senor  
Lascurain was minister of foreign re-  
lations in the cabinet of President  
Madero and served a few hours as  
provisional president before Huerta  
succeeded him. He is understood to  
have been a leading candidate of the  
mediators and American delegates at  
Niagara Falls, when they were can-  
vassing for a compromise candidate  
to succeed Huerta in case the Consti-  
tutionalists would accept a "neu-  
tral."

El Paso, July 4—While the warring  
factions of the Constitutionalists are  
attempting to adjust their differences  
the arrest and possible execution of a  
British subject in Constitutional  
territory has developed a new com-  
plication.

James Caldwell, the British consular  
agent at Zacatecas, reported today  
that George St. Claire Douglas, a  
Scotchman, was under arrest and  
about to be subjected to a court mar-  
tial on a charge of having assisted  
the Federals during the capture of  
the city by Villa's troops.

H. C. Miles, the British vice coun-  
sel at El Paso, after consulting with  
both Carranza and Villa agents here  
today finally secured assurances that  
no disposition of the Douglas case  
would be made until Theodore Hamm  
American consul at Durango, reached  
Zacatecas and investigated the af-  
fairs on behalf of the Washington  
state department and the British  
foreign office.

### THE KINDNESS OF VIRTUE.

It has come as a surprise to the  
many followers of Cosmo Hamilton  
in this country that the original  
suggestion for the dramatization of  
"The Kindness of Virtue," which  
will be seen at the Opera House on  
Thursday evening next, came from  
the Bishop of London. Up to recent-  
ly it was presumed that the play,  
which deals with sex education and  
attracted profound attention in Eng-  
land and this country, was the re-  
sult of the author's wish to evolve  
the question on the stage, but that  
the suggestion came directly from  
the noted English churchman became  
known recently when Mr. Hamilton  
revealed a conversation he held with  
the Bishop of London last year  
abroad. "I wrote the play on the  
proposition that mothers should be  
interested for their daughters," says  
Mr. Hamilton. I have been tremen-  
dously impressed with the fact that  
in America the mothers have crowded  
the matinees, bringing their daugh-  
ters with them, and I have received  
thousands of letters from mothers  
asking for the opportunity of letting  
their clubs and societies in the

### RECORD WINTER RYE.

The window of the Board of Trade  
Office contains a sample of winter rye  
grown upon the fruit farm of James  
S. Neil at Royal Road West, eight  
miles from Fredericton. The rye is  
six feet four inches in height and was  
part of a cover crop in the orchard.  
It was planted last fall and is super-  
ior to any similar crop grown in  
the northwest. Mr. Neil has twenty-  
five acres planted with two thousand  
apple-trees and fifteen acres of that  
planted with rye. He purchased the  
farm in a runout condition in 1912  
and by planting two bushels of buck-  
wheat to the acre as a cover crop,  
has restored its fertility.
