## Special Notice

Rules governing calls from Fredericton to Keswick.

Beginning July 1st calls can be given by EITHER of two methods, namely:

LONG DISTANCE where a PARTICULAR PERSON is wanted.

TWO NUMBER where a Subscriber is willing to talk to ANY PERSON at the telephone called.

LONG DISTANCE METHOD. If a particular person is desired the call should be placed with the Long Distance Operator in the regular way. The initial rate for this service will be 10 cents for 3 minutes and 5 cents for each additional minute.

TWO NUMBER METHOD.—The Subscriber calls the operator in the usual manner. The Operator will answer, saying "Number." The Subscriber will then give the Operator the desired number, followed by his own number, as "Keswick 6-14! This is 178-12."

The calling Subscriber will hold the receiver to his ear until connected with the called telephone, or is advised "Line Busy," or "They Don't Answer." If the called telephone answers it constitutes a message. A Particular Person will NOT be procured. The initial rate for this service will be 5 cents for 3 minutes and 1 cent for each additional minute. Messages cannot be reversed but must be charged to the telephone from which they originate.

IMPORTANT.—As the operator can not tell the telephone number of the person calling, it is necessary that the subscriber, on either a special or party line, should give his own number, as well as the number desired. A call from a subscriber in Fredericton at 102, wishing to get Keswick 18, should be given as follows:—"KESWICK 18! THIS IS 102."

## HOW TO CALL BY

TWO NUMBER METHOD

SUBSCRIBER—Calls Central in the usual way.

OPERATOR—Answers by saying: "Number?"

SUBSCRIBER—Says "Keswick 6-14! This is 178-11."

OPERATOR—Repeats "Keswick 6-14! 178-11."

SUBSCRIBER—Waits for called telephone to answer or is advised "Line Busy" or "They Don't Answer!"

ROYAL WEDDING  
ANNIVERSARY TODAY

London, July 6.—The twenty-first anniversary of the marriage of the King and Queen was celebrated today at Windsor, when the bells of St. George's Chapel and of Windsor Parish church were rung, and at mid-day a salute of twenty-one guns was fired in the Long Walk. An hour later a second salute was fired in honor of the birthday anniversary of Princess Victoria, second daughter of the late King Edward VII, who was born July 6, 1868.

AT WOLFVILLE

A copy of the Acadia Ladies' Seminary Catalog for the year 1914-1915 has just come to our table. It is finely printed, well illustrated, and bound in an attractive cover. An examination of the catalogue shows that the work of this well known school, which is achieving such wide popularity, is arranged in three divisions. The first division under the general head Academic outlines the work of the Collegiate, the Senior or Sophomore and the Junior Matriculation Courses. The Second Division is captioned, Eleven teachers devote themselves to the work of this division. The courses are modern, thorough, and demand upon the part of the pupils who expects to complete either the course in pianoforte, organ, violin, elocution, art, etc., application, ability, self-restraint. The Director, of the Conservatory, Mr. McKee and four assistants, Mrs. Richmond of the vocal department, Miss Langley in violin, Mrs. Shreve Bayman in oratory, Miss Bailey in Art, are all well known artists and specialists in their work. The conservatory takes a front place in the rank of similar schools.

The Third Division is that of practical Arts which includes the teaching of business, Stenography, typewriting household science, with the normal training courses and the courses for home makers. The work in the household science department is in the efficient hands of Miss McIntyre and Miss Chute, while Miss McPhee, formerly a teacher in the Maritime Business College, directs the work in the business department.

Principal De Wolfe reports that the Seminary has in 1913-1914 had the most successful year in its history. The attendance has aggregated 321. To meet the demand for places a new department will be opened in a separate building, and will be known as the junior department where girls under the age of fifteen will be housed and taught independently of the senior school. It is believed that this is the first school in Eastern Canada which seeks to establish a junior department in a separate building.
