COUNCIL WILL MAKE IMPORTANT DECISIONS TOMORROW NIGHT

One Contract Involves the City for Ten Years and the Other in Unprofitable Twenty-One Year Leases

A serious responsibility rests with the City Council in the decision they reach tomorrow night on the reports of the Light Committee and the Committee on Civic Finance. Each of these reports are involving long-term contracts with the city, which require the greatest caution in deciding.

The Light Committee will recommend through Ald. Ebbett, that the city enter into a ten-year agreement with the Fredericton Gaslight Company for the provision of street lighting. The contract which is recommended has been thoroughly gone into by the council in committee and has found favor in its eyes.

The meeting of tomorrow is to give the long delayed decision on the matter.

The Finance Committee, through the chairman, Ald. Reid, will present its findings as to the renewal of the twenty-one year leases of city land to various mercantile concerns in Fredericton. The question of taxes on this land will also be discussed. There is no question in the minds of the council members but that land which is being used to a profit in a business way should be productive of municipal revenue but the council will be confronted with a legal obstacle of the taxation of their own land.

Another matter which will be presented to the council is the claim of H. Greer, who will ask for \$150 dam-

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MILITIAMEN OBJECT TO DELAY IN TRANSPORTATION

York County Troops Lay all Friday Night in Open at Sussex Siding ---Camp Was One of the Best

The military special train bearing the York County militia, who had spent twelve days training at Camp Sussex, arrived here at about 2.30 Saturday afternoon after a run of nine and a half hours from Sussex. The Fredericton companies of the 71st York Regt. were under the command of Capt. W. J. Osborne and the members of the 28th New Brunswick Dragoons were under the command of Lieut. Lounsbury of this city. E and G Companies of the 71st Regt. were dismissed at the I.R.C. station on the arrival of the train but the band and D Company marched to the Armory. B Company of Burt's Corner, left the train at Gibson and C Company of Stanley at Cross Creek.

All ranks of the local militia are very indignant on account of the treatment given them at Sussex Friday night through mismanagement in connection with the transport arrangements. The train for Fredericton was scheduled to leave at 2 a.m. and the 71st Regt. and the Dragoons marched to the siding at the camp grounds at midnight in accordance with order. No train was ready, however, delay the previous afternoon having made all troop-trains several hours late in leaving. The York County troops were not informed of the delay and the majority of them lay beside the siding all night without any protection. The cars which were to be used by them were hauled into Sussex instead of being
