the company for the first nine months of the present fiscal year, which ends on June 30 next, have been approximately \$3,900,000 and according to present indications the net earnings for the present year will only be about \$5,250,000.

The net earnings last year totalled \$8,461,096 and the fixed charges and outstanding securities were \$6,460,380. It is apparent therefore, that the net earnings this year will fall some \$2,000,000 short of paying the fixed charges. Under the circumstances the estimate of \$5,125,000 as net earnings for next year, to say the least, looks to be unduly optimistic. This is a phase of the question vital to the whole matter now before parliament.

HURRYING THINGS ALONG.

At the opening of the House Premier Borden again introduced his resolution to have mornings sittings beginning Monday.

Sir Wilfrid suggested that the mornings sittings should not commence until next Wednesday, as only five of the fourteen government bills of which notice had been given had been presented to the House. The other nine should be brought down this week or allowed to go over until next session.

"We had better make a beginning," said Premier Borden in reply, "or we will never get to the end of the session."

He promised to bring down the remaining legislation as soon as possible and told Sir Wilfrid, in response to the latter's enquiry, that he was not sure whether the co-operative bank bill would be introduced this year. The resolution was finally passed for morning sittings on Monday.

Hon. Col. Sam Hughes told E. M. MacDonald, who asked whether permission had been given the Royal Canadian Regiment Band to attend a political demonstration in Halifax on April 29, that the band was permitted under the regulations to take part in demonstrations unconnected with the militia subject to the approval of its commanding officer, provided that a Union Jack three feet by four feet in size, was carried. When a commanding officer refused permission he was required to report the matter to headquarters. In conclusion the minister of militia stated that the Royal Canadian Regiment Band had not been out on the evening of April 29.

ENGLISH MAN WILL REMODEL ATHENS

Thomas H. Mawson Gets Royal Commission—Has Also Plans For Canadian Cities

The Greeks have paid a great compliment to an Englishman. They have commissioned Mr. Thomas H. Mawson, of Lancaster, the well known authority on landscape architecture and city planning, to prepare comprehensive plans for the extension, remodelling and beautification of the city of Athens.

Mr. Mawson has just come back after a visit of some weeks' duration to the Grecian capital, where he has laid out the new Royal gardens as well as planned the Royal burying-ground at Tatol, a few miles from Athens. It is on the personal recommendation of King Constantine and his Consort that he has been entrusted with the task of preparing a scheme which is to make Athens as impressive, hygienic and convenient as any first class city in Europe. During his visit their Majesties accompanied by the Mayor of Athens, went over the whole city with Mr. Mawson in order to give him a thorough understanding of the results desired.

In a talk with a "Daily Graphic" representative, Mr. Mawson said:

"Athens is already on a more scientific plan than any British city, with the possible exception of Edinburgh. But it is growing so fast—50,000 was added to the population last year—that we must look ahead, and my plans will provide for any extension of the city which is at all likely to take place for fifty years to come. I have to include provision for one immense central railway station, instead of a number of small termini as now. I have also to make provision for the new Law Courts and other official buildings, for a palatial new hotel, for broad boulevards (one will connect the city with the Piræus), and for a complete park and playground system.

"It is also intended to reorganize the water supply of the city, and a rehousing scheme will be necessary owing to the proposed clearing away of the hovels which have accumulated round the base of the Acropolis, and form such an eyesore to tourists. It is also proposed to establish a National Nursery for the cultivation of plants indigenous to the Kingdom. The wave of regenerating patriotism which is sweeping over the Greeks is an effect I think you may say, of the national struggle in which they have been engaged."

FOUND HUSBAND ON STAGE

Wife Accidentally Discovered Erring Spouse in Theatre

Appearing at the South-Western Court, to support a summons against her husband for desertion, Mrs. Athrell told a dramatic story of how she found her errant spouse. The latter is Ernest Albert Athrell, member of a theatrical company known as "The Ten Loomers," whose address was given as "The Theatre," Bedminster, Somersetshire.

She said her husband deserted her in 1908. She had no knowledge what had become of him until one evening when at the Cumberland Music Hall she recognized him as he made his appearance on the stage. He was one of "The Ten Loomers." She waited for him at the stage door. When he caught sight of her he said, "Why, I thought you were dead." He also said he had arranged to marry another lady. Mrs. Athrell added that she went to the music hall by chance, without any thought of seeing her husband there.

Athrell did not appear, and the case was heard in his absence.

The wife, who had one child, was granted a judicial separation, and an order made on the husband to allow her 20s. weekly and pay 25s. costs.

"Reading" Constable's Character

The reading of a constable's character caused much laughter in the Belfast Court, when Alice and Eva Heslon, mother and daughter, were charged with "using a subtle craft by palmistry to impose on one of his Majesty's subjects," and were bound over not to repeat the offence. Constable Doyle told how he found the defendants at a stall in North street, and consulted the younger. ("He has an eye for beauty," said Mr. Graham, defending solicitor.) He paid twopence, and a glass was placed on the palm of his hand through which defendant looked, and marked the points of his character. His character was "fond of changes, firm in arguments, good conversational power, independent in spirit, keen perception, great sympathy." (Laughter.)

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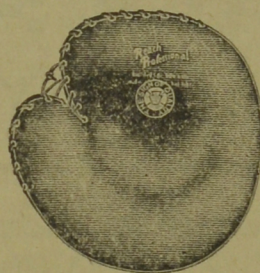

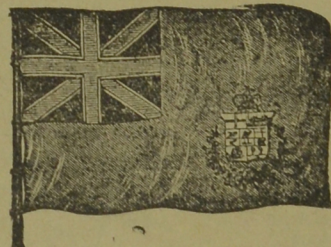
