London, May 3.—A blind man, Mr. Elliot Williams, flew six miles at the rate of sixty-five miles an hour in company with Mr. Gustav Hamel at since his blindness he had never enjoyed anything so much.

"I felt as though I were on the back of some great seagull, flying through a dense mist. Blindness is oblivion, but when I was up in the air, I felt not darkness."

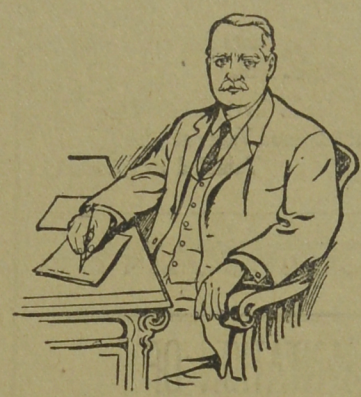
It is just three months ago since Mr. Williams, while journeying back to his native land from British Columbia, lost his sight. He had been married nearly two years, but was travelling alone. One day he noticed the things around him growing dim, and then for days everything became darker and darker. When he reached Paddington he made his way home with the aid of a stick, for there was no one to meet him. His home and friends were in Cornwall.

Braille books have brought light into Mr. Williams' life. Reading yesterday through space in Mr. Hamel's monoplane, he enjoyed a new sensation, all the more wonderful since he has never seen a flying machine. When he alighted he found the side of the monoplane and said how sorry he was that the light had been so short. The wind astonished him, but most of all the power of the airplane to control the elements driving the machine," he added, with a little touch of envy, "must feel like a god."

LITTLE THIN MEN LIVE MUCH LONGER

(Toronto News) Beware of the big, heavy, hale and robust man, say the life insurance agents. The thin man of 35 or more, who doesn't look as though his physical machinery would last a year, is the pride and joy of every regular actuary in the life insurance field.

This situation has developed as the result of the "cost of high living" that has become so popular in recent years among those successful in the business field.

At sessions of the Medical Directors' Association and the Actuarial Society, of America, it was found that the mortality tables showed a steady rise in large heavy men of 45 years or over, while the average expectation of life, the technical phrase which covers the law of averages in death, is really higher.

DEATH RATE IS LESS.

"The death rate is less today because of sanitary conditions," declared a local actuary. "Much of this is due to the tremendous fight which has been made against tuberculosis. Infectious diseases are also being successfully fought by the physicians."

"But the deaths of men over 45 years of age has increased. At that period of life men have outlived most of the marks heredity has left on them. Deaths are usually due to heart disease, Bright's disease, apoplexy, cancer and diseases of the arteries. The mortality from cancer alone is thirty per cent."

"Diseases of childhood leave their effects, also. Scarlet fever, for instance, may be the cause of kidney age or older. The United States disease in men, who are 45 years of reports show that more alcohol is consumed in this country than ever before, and deaths from alcoholism have increased according to our tables, one investigation bearing out the results of the other."

EAT RICHER FOOD.

"The standard of living appears to be responsible for the increase of deaths of men over 45. People eat more food and richer food than they should. The plain fare of our fathers does not satisfy the man of today."

"Another cause of the increased deaths—and this may astound many—is the growth of corporations. The corporation has taken away the initiative of the individual. They have reduced the amount of work that many men would perform if they were in business for themselves. Result—men grow lazy and fat."

"The heavy man is distinctly in bad fat. We have found that they are not in the best class of risks. We had a man in the office the other day, but 41 years old, yet we had to insure him as though he were 57 years old. He is in a new classification. So are all other heavy men."

"As age continues large men usually remain the same or increase but little in weight. They are not so subject to pneumonia. They rarely have it all over the big man and make the best risks. And the tables of deaths, prepared after many years and from many hundred thousand cases, bear this out."

In 1903 Jersey City won the International league championship with the highest average (.741) ever made by a team in the league. The "Skeeters" evidently played themselves out in that year, for they have never been up there since.

LATE DUNCAN McMARTIN HAD A ROMANTIC CAREER

Toronto, May 5.—Duncan McMartin, director of Hollinger Mines, formerly one of the chief owners of the LaRose Lawson, Princess and other valuable mines at Cobalt, died at the Wellesley Hospital here on Saturday night. He was taken ill with a cold about two weeks ago. While at the Windsor Hotel, Montreal, where he usually stayed when in that city from New York, the cold developed into bronchitis. Before he had quite recovered he came on here, caught fresh cold en route and had an attack of pneumonia.

For a week Mr. McMartin hovered between life and death and it was his strong constitution which enabled him to fight off the end so long. Four doctors were called in consultation, namely, Dr. Craven, Dr. Mopheadran, Dr. J. E. Elliott and Dr. Anderson.

SEVERAL TIMES A MILLIONAIRE

It was Duncan McMartin's romantic fate and misfortune, to be several times a millionaire in the early forties of his life and to have his career terminated just when greater wealth and the enjoyment it afforded was in the maturing. The McMartin brothers were familiar figures throughout the Canadian and American west, where they won enviable reputations for their sterling integrity as railroad contractors. Duncan was in the employ of nicolite and silver. The lucky blacksmith, Fred LaRose, made that discovery which was one of the sensations attending Cobalt's fatal days. LaRose chanced upon a piece of ore which resembled copper. It happened to be nicolite and silver. The lucky blacksmith went to Duncan McMartin. They agreed to go halves, neither realizing what they really had found. With the cunningness of his Highland ancestry, Duncan McMartin told LaRose to have Hebert, one of his assistants, hunt around for more ore. Hebert found it too—but that is another story, the first chapter one of the ugliest incidents in the history of Cobalt.

JOHN McMARTIN JOINS HIS BROTHER.

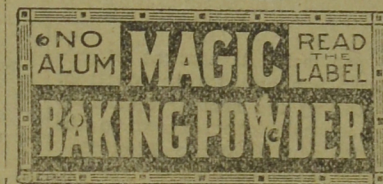
Duncan McMartin proposed to his brother, one of the contractors on the Temiskaming and Northern Ontario Railroad, that he take an interest in the LaRose find. This was declined. Contractor McMartin wanted no mines. He was satisfied with his railroad work. So Duncan sought his brother, John McMartin, at Cornwall and sold a quarter interest in the LaRose. In combination, John McMartin began to prospect the LaRose ground. Opportunely, L. Harry Timmins made a deal with LaRose for a quarter interest, in behalf of himself, Noah A. Timmins and David A. Dunlap. Subsequently, Messrs. Timmins and Dunlap acquired the remaining LaRose quarter.

THE FAMOUS QUINTETTE.

That was the beginning of five millionaires—the famous quintette, whose nerve and fair dealing has given them success at Cobalt and promises infinitely more from their Hollinger, Miller-Dixon and Miller-Middleton holdings at Porcupine. Those five members of the original Alpha Syndicate have an historic place in Canadian mining and Duncan McMartin was unspoiled by it all. His bonhomme was a distinguishing trait. He was fair and hearty to his friends and gifted with a rare discernment in business affairs. Within ten years

BUSINESS NOT DISTURBED.

The death of Mr. McMartin will not disturb his business affairs, which are in excellent shape. His Hollinger interests are included in the Canadian Mining and Finance Company, the holding company in behalf of the joint interests of the five partners. These will continue intact. Mr. McMartin also had valuable real estate holdings in New York, and a large tract of land in the west. It is understood that his estate will be administered by his family and intimate friends and business associates. (Mr. John McMartin, who was a sub-contractor on the N.T.R. Railway, near Stanley, was a brother of the deceased.)

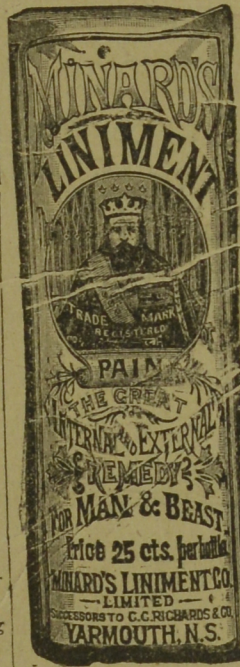

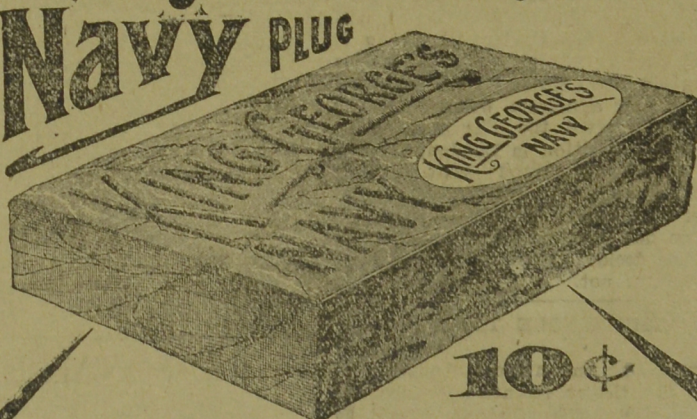
