CITY MOTOR TRUCK BILL AMENDED BY THE HOUSE

(Continued from Page One.)

suggested was not what the petitioners were asking for, because the petitioners asked to have the bill killed altogether. The New Brunswick Board of Fire Underwriters had threatened an increase in rates in Fredericton unless an improvement was provided in the fire fighting apparatus of the city. Letters and telegrams had passed and now the Underwriters, approving of the purchase of a motor truck had notified the City authorities that if a motor truck was procured there would not be an increase in rate in Fredericton, but on the other hand they were prepared to take 5 cents off of all mercantile buildings and contents. The fire department of the City was in a position where it was absolutely necessary that there be some improvement made in the apparatus and he believed that the merchants and business men of the City would like to benefit from a reduction in insurance rates such as was offered by the Underwriters if a motor truck was procured.

Mr. Pinder said that the amendment which he proposed would not deprive the City of Fredericton from having a motor truck if they wished to mitigate it was suggested that any citizens an opportunity to decide for themselves whether they did or did not want to have a motor truck.

Mr. Munro said that when the bill was before the Municipalities Committee it was suggested that any proposed amendments might be made in the Committee of the whole House. He said that in a number of controversial questions in bills this session, provision had been made for a two thirds vote of the Council, instead of merely a majority vote, to make the legislation effective, and he suggested such a provision for this bill.

MR. SLIPP'S VIEWS.

Mr. Slipp said there was a great difference of opinion among the citizens of Fredericton, on the question of purchasing a motor truck and he thought the Committee should pause before passing the bill as drawn. The use of a motor truck would be confined to a few months in the year. One had to look through the window and see how much use one would be in weather like the present. The Council should not have this power unless the people wanted it. In his opinion the City had sufficient fire protection at present. The Underwriters were not entitled to much consideration; they are a close corporation existing for monopolistic purposes, which periodically

puts up the rates for no reason whatever. Every now and then some of their representatives would come up to the City and represent is certain things are done they will lower the rates, and they don't do so when the things are done. The telegram which the member for York had read was thorough characteristic of them. He felt that the City of Fredericton owed nothing to the Underwriters. A large number of Fredericton merchants were out of sympathy with the idea of purchasing to him to be no reason for buying one because the Underwriters suggested it. The tax in the city was heavy enough as it was, without putting any more on to it.

Mr. Baxter favored the safeguard of a two-thirds vote of the Council before the debentures could be issued.

The Chairman pointed out that the discussion was out of order, as an amendment to the bill required one day's notice.

Mr. Stewart, (Northumberland) thought it was stretching the intention of the rule to say the amendment was out of order, because the object of the rule was to afford protection, which was just what the amendment aimed at.

Dr. Price said the amount of debentures was very small to make much fuss about. Moncton had spent twelve or thirteen thousand dollars in buying a motor truck, and when they got it, didn't know how they had done without it so long.

Mr. Tilley favored a two-thirds safeguard.

Mr. Tilley agreed and appealed to his colleagues to fall in line.

Mr. Pinder said he had no personal interest one way or the other, he was merely acting as he did at the request of a large number of citizens. If the provision for a vote of two-thirds of the Council would meet the case he was quite agreeable.

Mr. Guthrie was willing to accept the amendment, provided no further amendment was brought up on the third reading. It was not often he differed with his friend Mr. Pinder; their views on public matters generally agreed; his only objection to the proposal was he thought it was a reflection on the City Council, which he thought was quite capable of taking care of the interests of the City.

Mr. Pinder took exception to Mr. Guthrie's remarks re any further amendment on the third reading. That would be a piece of sharp practice of which he wouldn't be guilty.

The bill was then agreed to as amended.

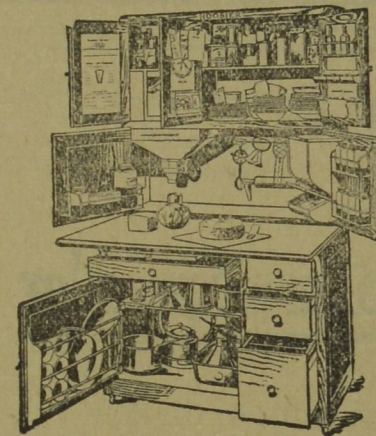
