COMING IN JUNE

ST. JOHN GARRISON MESS

Officers of the militia corps of St. John are considering the establishment of a garrison mess. A meeting was held Wednesday night at which Col. H. H. McLean presided. A committee was appointed to deal with the matter and report later.

ON SUSPENDED SENTENCE.

The Police Commission yesterday decided to suspend sentence in connection with Thomas Feeney and Bert Lint, convicted of third offenses against the Canada Temperance Act. The suspension will be on condition of entire abandonment of the sale of liquor on the part of the offenders.

The deceased is survived by her parents, three brothers, Michael, Thomas and Lewis, and three sisters, Mary, Frances and Loretta.

N. S. GAME RECORD.

Halifax Chronicle:—Moose reported killed during the past season total 678. This is an increase of 71 over the number reported for the previous year. In estimating the total number killed allowance must be made for those killed in and out of season that have not been reported. Probably the total kill would exceed 800. A comparison of the figures of 1913 to 1908 will show that since the cow moose have been protected there has been each year an increase in the number of bulls killed and that the number of bulls killed in the season of 1912 about equalled the total number of bulls and cows killed in 1908.

THE WORLD'S STATEMENT

The Chatham World, whose editor is a member of the legislative assembly, says in an editorial column:—"It is charged that Hon. H. F. McLeod was given \$4,000 by the Valley Railway Company for searching titles at \$5 a search and that he farmed the work out at a fraction of his fee. A Fredericton subcontractor says publicly that he had to give Mr. McLeod \$1,500 before he could get his contract. He lost money on the job and feels sore at having to pay for an unprofitable contract. These charges, and others of the same kind, should be investigated before giving the Valley Railway Company \$2,000,000 more."

HEAVY FRESHET
EXPECTED BY
THE LUMBERMEN

More Snow on Lower River Than in
Twenty-Seven Years Past---The
usual Amount on Upper
River

According to the information given The Mailby R. A. McFadden, lumber surveyor for the New Brunswick Railway Company, who has been over the ground lately, there is more snow along the St. John River south of Grand Falls than in any winter in the past twenty-seven years. In 1887 there were six and seven feet of snow during the winter and the spring saw the highest freshet on record along the St. John River. Residents of Fredericton remember that spring well as the river rose high enough to permit water to back up on Brunswick street and other low parts of the city. Another remarkably high freshet may be expected this year.

There is much more snow in the southern part of the province than in the north. On the headwaters of the St. John and its lower tributaries the snow is no heavier than usual. On the Bequimic and the Keswick about four feet of snow is lying. On the Restigouche the snow is not as deep as it usually is and it is light and dry. On the St. Francis there is about four feet of snow, which is not yet wasted.

Mr. McFadden says that with another week's cool weather such as the province has had lately the driving prospects will be excellent.

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DETECTIVE ROBERTS
CANNOT ACT AS
AGENT OF S. P. C.

Police Commission Rules That He
Has Agreed to Give all His Services
to the Police Department

The Police Commission met yesterday and among other business considered the matter of Detective James Roberts having accepted appointment as agent for the local Society for Prevention of Cruelty at a salary of one hundred dollars per year. The commission after deliberating upon the matter decided that Detective Roberts was not at liberty to accept such an appointment having agreed when appointed to the police force to devote all his attention and services to the work of the Police Department in return for the salary paid him. The Chief of Police on instructions from the commission is to inform Detective Roberts of the decision.

The commission further decided to notify L. C. McNutt, president of the S.P.C. that the services of any member of the police force would be available for the society to enforce law or investigate cases within the City.

The Police Commission took into consideration the fact that the local S.P.C. had as its district the counties of York and Sunbury and does not desire to have a police officer to hold an office which might necessitate his going to any part of either county.

The application for increased pay made by some members of the police force at a recent meeting of the commission has been refused.

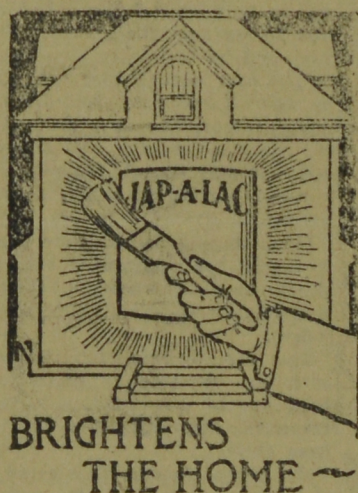
