CARLETON COUNTY
FARMERS VICTIMIZED

Hartland, Aug. 19—For several months past a man named James Sirios has been going through Carleton County purporting to be organizing a farmers' grange similar to the co-operative society in the United States. Each party who joined paid Sirios one dollar and received a membership card. It is believed that at least 3,000 joined the society of which one Dr. Cleveland of St. John is the reputed president.

Several of the farmers became suspicious and on Saturday night Sirios was arrested by Officer A. R. Foster on complaint of William Hallett and was admitted to bail by M. L. Hayward, Justice of the Peace. Today the trial was held and the evidence taken under consideration by the justice a decision to be given on Monday.

As soon as the proceedings terminated Sirios was again arrested on a warrant issued by Justice John Barnett, charging him with obtaining money from Sydney Merrithew by falsely pretending that he was Dr. Cleveland. Mr. Barnett refused bail and the prisoner was remanded to Woodstock jail until Saturday next.

The matter created considerable interest and the village was crowded with members anxious to surrender their membership cards and receive their money back.

BRIEFS

Omaha, Aug. 19—The Middle West tennis tournament opened on the courts of the Omaha Field club today with the greatest attendance of tennis players and enthusiasts ever gathered together at one of these tournaments. This is the tenth year of this championship event and since its establishment under the rules of the National Lawn Tennis association, the championship in singles and doubles has been held in Iowa, Nebraska, Illinois and Kansas. The present holder of the championship singles is Walter T. Hayes of Chicago and Mr. Hayes with Paul Gardner are the present holders of the championship in doubles.

Philadelphia, Aug. 19—In order to forestall a threatened freight car shortage such as existed in Toronto in 1907 just before the panic, Eastern Railroads are urging shippers everywhere to aid them by promptly loading and unloading cars. According to an official statement issued by the Pennsylvania Railway, the quantity of freight already being handled is already so large that the co-operation of the road patrons is necessary to preclude serious congestion in the fall. The road advises shippers to have freight ready for loading when the cars are delivered and to aid in the scheme of relief by loading each car as nearly to capacity as possible.

Kentville, N. S., Aug. 18—Elwood Martell, a 14 year old boy from Halifax, who had joined the cadets on Friday and had gone to Aldershot camp the same day was drowned today while attempting to swim across Killam's mill pond. He was with several companions who could not swim. They gave the alarm, but before help came the boy was gone. Martell had not done any drilling previously with the Cadets and had been employed at the Nova Scotia Car Works, from which he got off for a week to go to the camp. An inquest will be held.

HOW TO PASTEURIZE MILK.

Milk intended for the babies should be pasteurized. Do not take chances on letting the little ones "catch" typhoid fever by drinking impure milk. Milk may be pasteurized at home easily and without affecting its food value. The accompanying diagram shows how.

Place a saucer in a small tin pan or other vessel. Stand the bottle of milk (with cap on bottle) in the saucer. Now pour hot water (not hot enough to break the bottle) into the tin pan and fill it until the water comes within two or three inches of the bottle. Then stand pan and contents on the stove.

Remove the bottle of milk from the pan the instant the water begins to boil, and cool it as rapidly as possible. Keep the bottle of milk in the ice box and keep the cap on the bottle when not in use.

When removing the cap do it with a clean fork prong. Be careful that milk-side of the cap does not come in contact with anything dirty.

NEWS FORECAST FOR THE WEEK

Washington, D. C., Aug. 17—The formal notification of the Democratic and Republican nominees for Vice President will be among the leading events of the week in relation to the national campaign. The notification of Governor Thomas R. Marshall the running mate of Woodrow Wilson on the Democratic ticket, will take place in Indianapolis Tuesday. The ceremony will be held at the State Fair grounds and is to be made the occasion of a big Democratic demonstration. The chief features of the program will be the notification speech by Judge Alton B. Parker of New York and Governor Marshall's address of acceptance.

Vice President Sherman will be notified of his renomination at his home in Utica. The entertainment will start Tuesday evening with a band concert, fireworks and parade. The formal ceremonies will be held the following day in Roscoe Conkling Park. Senator Sutherland of Utah has been selected to make the notification address.

Georgia Democrats will engage in a general primary election Wednesday, when a preference will be taken for United States senator and candidates named for governor and other State officers to be voted for in the coming election. It is expected that the United States Senator Bacon will be named to succeed himself. Chief interest center in the contest for the governorship between John M. Slaton Atlanta and Joe Hill Hall of Macon.

Republicans of Delaware will hold their State convention in Dover on Tuesday for the nomination of a complete State ticket and elect delegates for presidential electors.

The President and Mrs. Taft and many other notable men and women have accepted invitations to attend the garden party to be held Friday on the magnificent John Hays Hammond estate at Gloucester, Mass., for the purpose of raising funds with which to erect a memorial arch in Washington to the memory of the men who went down with the Titanic.

Of interest to church circles will be the consecration of Mgr. George

Gauthier as bishop of Philippopolis and auxiliary bishop of Montreal. The ceremony is to take place in Montreal on Saturday.

Saturday is the day set for the official welcome to be given in New York in honor of the victorious American athletes who took part in the recent Olympic games at Stockholm. The program will include a great parade down Broadway, to be followed by the ceremonies of welcome at the City Hall and a grand banquet in the evening at Terrace Garden.

Among the conventions of the week will be the American Apple growers' Congress at St. Louis, the annual meeting of the American Federation of Catholic Societies at Louisville, the national reunion of the Loyal Order of Moose at Kansas City, and the annual meeting of the National Negro Business League at Chicago.
