**TERRACE QUEEN AND THREE OTHER HORSES POISONED**  
 Well-Water at Middleton Track Contaminated by Surface Washings--Terrace Queen Valued at \$1,700

Halifax N. S., Aug. 20—Four valuable racing horses died yesterday at Middleton from cerebral spinal meningitis. The victims of the disease include the mare Terrace Queen, 2:06, owned by C. E. Dewitt of Bridgetown, and valued at \$1,700. Terrace Queen was one of the finest bred mares in the lower provinces, and is said to have headed the famous Dan Patch in a heat before she came to Halifax.

Another victim of the disease, which is not contagious is Harry Lydiard's Ferrona, 2:21 1/2. A mare owned by Dr. Fauley, together with her yearling colt are also dead. The epidemic and the death of these horses were precipitated by the continued rains washing the animal and vegetable contaminations of an extended area into the well on the race track grounds, thereby giving the water no chance to be filtered as heretofore during less rainy seasons.
