TO SEE HISTORY IN PAGEANTRY

St. Louis, Mo., May 27—Beginning today and continuing each day during the remainder of the week St. Louis is to have the opportunity of seeing practically the whole of her history unrolled before her own eyes and those of her neighbors in living portraiture and brilliant symbolic display. The pageant which is declared to be the most elaborate ever attempted in America, is in celebration of the 150th anniversary of the founding of the city by Pierre Laclède.

Seven thousand five hundred performers have been engaged to take part in the series of tableaux and the great picture drama. In addition to these hundreds of men and women have been working for months with sketches, costumes and ideas to make the pageant as accurate historically as possible. The plans have been carried out under the general direction of Thomas Wood Stevens head of the school of drama in the Carnegie Institute, assisted by Percy Mackaye, the poet and dramatist and Joseph Lindon Smith of Philadelphia. Frederick S. Converse of Boston, is in charge of the music. The scene of the spectacles is Forest Park, where there is a great natural amphitheatre capable of accommodating seventy-five thousand people.

"This book, sir," he said, "is invaluable to parents. When your children ask you difficult questions, you can refer to this and give them the answer, without having to confess that you don't know."

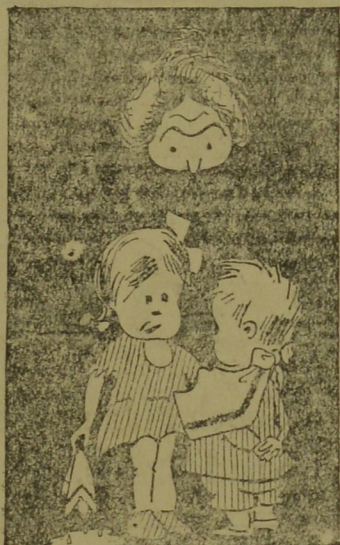
"I haven't any children!" growled Crusty.

POWER FROM THE SUN

Remarkable Efficiency in Generating
Heat From Old Sol

The sun power plant, by which low-pressure steam is generated by the heat of the sun's rays, recently erected at Meadi, near Cairo, has given satisfactory results, and Lord Kitchener and Sir Reginald Wingate have invited the makers to put up a similar plant for irrigation work in the Soudan. The present plant working at Meadi is stated by the inventor, Mr. Frank Shuman, to have shown an efficiency of 57 per cent, which is 14 per cent. greater than that attained two years ago; this is as against an efficiency of 75 per cent. in the case of the steam boiler, and Mr. Shuman claims that the sun-heated boiler will eventually prove as efficient as, if it does not even surpass, the steam boiler. In the new plant for the Soudan the substitution of one large heat absorber for the five smaller units at present employed is being considered; these heaters at Cairo embrace an area of about 13,000 square feet, interspersed so that the total area is about one acre. The plant gives an average output of 50 brake horse-power during a ten-hour day. The new plant will exceed this in power, and as the latitude of Cairo is only 30 degrees North, the new plant, when working nearer the tropics, is expected to show a greater efficiency.

THE LAW OF KISSING

Court Decides the Question of When a Kiss Becomes an Assault

When is a kiss a legal kiss, and when does it become an assault?

The German Supreme Court has just had to decide this question, and the result is the following ruling:

"A kiss is an operation on the body of another which always requires the permission of the person kissed. Kisses may only be given without special permission when the tacit consent of the other is certain—that is to say, in the cases of close relatives, parents, children, and lovers. If the other not merely affects coyness, but offers serious resistance, it is to be assumed that the kiss is regarded as an illegal interference with personal rights and a violation of his or her honor."

"Whoever, under such circumstances, imposes a kiss on another renders himself, therefore, guilty of assault or battery. For the fulfilment of these conditions it suffices that the kiss is given against the will of the other. It is not necessary that he himself feels the kiss to be insulting."

A Giant Windmill

A windmill, which is said to be the largest of its kind in the world, has been brought into use at Harlingen, Friesland, for draining a tract of low land redeemed from the sea by high embankments, with an area of 1,856 acres. The machine, which has steel sails and is mounted on a steel tower, has a diameter of 50 feet, and is said to be capable of dealing with 64,000 to 70,000 cubic feet of water in an hour.

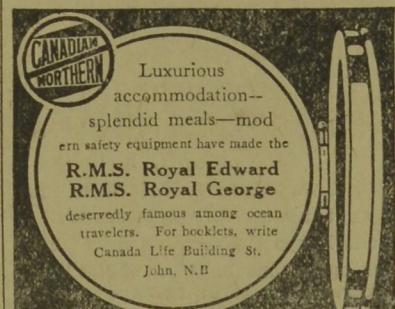
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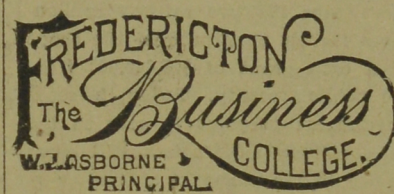
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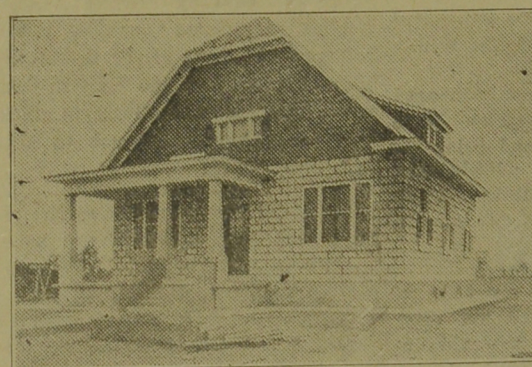
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
