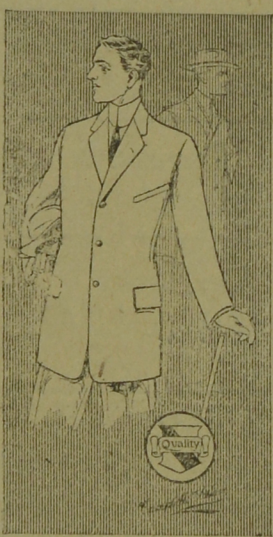

The Giants and Red Sox are great performers against leading teams. McGraw's men smothered the Pirates and the Sox beat the Tigers to a whisper.

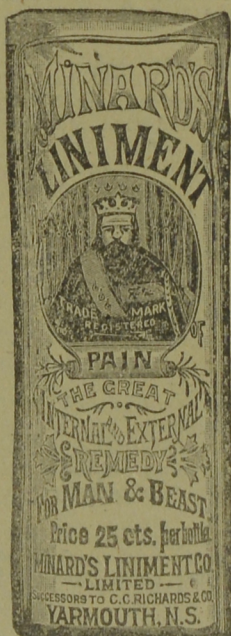
Harry Niles, the well known parachute jumper, who used to perform in the big show, is doing some fine work for the St. Paul American Association team.

TABLECLOTHS AND TALK OF TODAY

Isn't it really delightful that we are really becoming so sensible! This may be an age of absurdities and fads, but if a future historian should compare us with the times of the Louisies or the Early Victorian he would certainly by comparison call us a "simple age" as to our house furnishings at any rate.

Think of a drawing or description of a table set for a "refined family," a century ago! What a profusion of "plate," crystal "fruit salvers" and other ornamental table fittings there were!

In no one respect has table service so simplified as in the use of doilies, and "runners" and small cloths to replace the large table naper.

It may have been that with numerous servants to lift tablecloths a week mattered not. But with present problems of service, to try to make two cloths a week do, and then wish we could still further cut down our laundry bills.

So has come into general use the simple lunch cloth, the individual doily and the runner. All of these come in all styles and grades from imitation button-hole on coarse damask to lace. All are attractive and simple, and especially fitting for summer service.

In small lunch cloths there is also a wide choice, especially colored cloths, which are very far away from the "red tablecloth" of the long ago. These new cloths in all colors, mostly with conventional patterns.

There are also Japanese cloths, which come in all the gay hilarity of Old Japan. A set of these, with napkins, in blue or green is within the means of the moderate purse—so attractive they are and, what appeals especially to any practical mind, so easy to launder!

Then there are the "runners" which look particularly well with plain or craftsman furniture. These may be linen, crash, monks' cloth and of other similar materials.

The two strips, about eighteen inches wide, are laid at right angles across the centre of the table, and have decorated and embroidered ends. Or a whole tablecloth may be made of green or blue or brown denim and scalloped or edged with a heavy lace.

I have one friend who would not tolerate the usual cloths in summer and who evolved a crepe cloth of loveliness. Crepe in white, with heavy lace like imitation cluny, is very decorative, washes like a handkerchief and needs no ironing.

Why, is the housewife's work hard? Because she makes it so! Try a simpler summer service, and save time and laundry bills; besides if you do you will be a bit "different"—which is something we all like to be!

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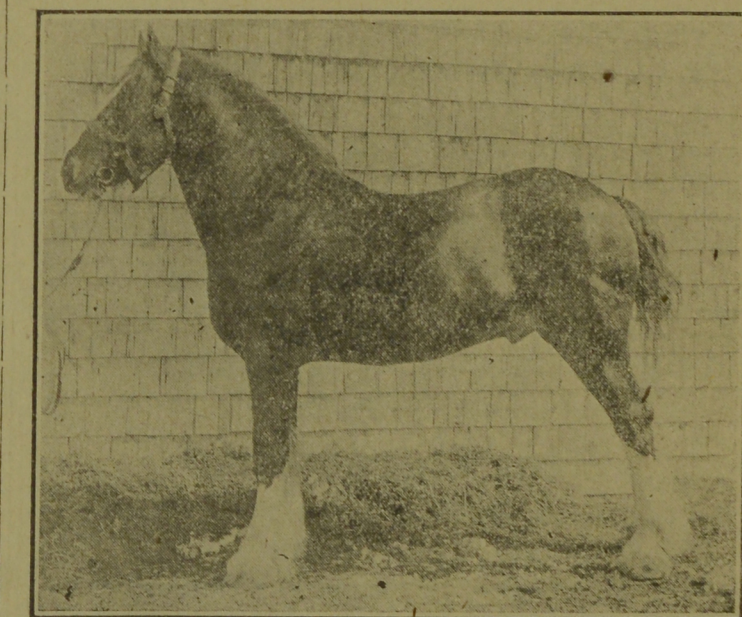
