MARITIME BANQUET AT CALGARY WELL ATTENDED

The following is from the "Western Standard" of recent date published at Calgary, Alta. The annual Maritime Banquet should interest Fredericton people as some well young men from this section of the province took an active part in the affair. Messrs. J.L. Neville and J.S. Mavor were both employed in the Mail Office at one time. Both are doing well in the west.

"Former residents of the Maritime Provinces to the number of about 350, attended the fifth annual banquet of the Maritime Province Association at Paget Hall on Tuesday evening. C.W. Matheson, B.A., LL.B., president of the association, occupied the chair, and welcomed the visitors in an eloquent address. Letters of regret at not being able to attend were read from Lieutenant-Governor Bulyea, Hon. C.R. Mitchell, Rev. Canon Montgomery, T.M. Tweedie, and S.B. Hillock's, M.P. P.'s. all former New Brunswickers.

The banquet hall was nicely decorated, and the feast of good things put on by the Ladies' Aid of the Church of England was very creditable.

After the good things provided had been disposed of, a delightful program of speech-making and musical numbers was carried out. The speeches referred to the glories of the old places down by the Atlantic, and pointed out how the sons of the Maritime Provinces had in one walk and another, taken a leading part in the upbuilding of the last Great West, and had carried to this new country the ideals which they had inherited from the sturdy old loyalists and other pioneers who had made the Maritime provinces what they are. The speakers pointed out that while the West provided the opportunities, the East furnished much of the brains and character, and many ideals much more valuable than wealth.

Mr. Stanley Jones, K.C., proposed the health of the City of Calgary which was responded to by Mayor Sinnott. Both gentlemen delivered excellent addresses.

"The Alberta Legislature" was proposed by F.M. Logan, formerly of Amherst, N.S., and responded by another gentleman from the same province, J.L. Jennison, K.C., both of whom delivered eloquent and appropriate addresses.

Rev. A.D. Archibald proposed the health of Nova Scotia, speaking in his usual fine style. He was replied to by J.A. Irvine, one of the founders of the association, who delivered an instructive address on the glories of Nova Scotia.

The Province of New Brunswick was proposed by J.L. Neville, in an appropriate manner, and brought forth one of the most eloquent speeches of the evening from J.S. Mavor, LL.B., president of the Bassano board of trade. Both speakers are former residents of the capital of New Brunswick, and what they don't know about that province is not worth knowing.

Prince Edward Island is the headquarters for MacDonalds, and it has sent several good men of the name to Calgary. Dr. J.E. MacDonald proposed the health of this little province, pointing out that "The Island" had supplied the world with leading educationalists. J.T. MacDonald replied, delivering one of his best speeches, which was both instructive and humorous. Both these "Mac's" by the way, are school trustees in Calgary.

George Ross, K.C., another former P.E.I. man who has become prominent in Calgary, proposed the health of the press, which was responded to by Rev. Mr. Smith, of Macleod.

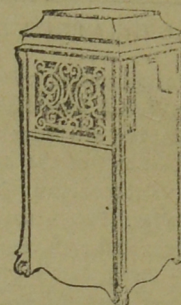

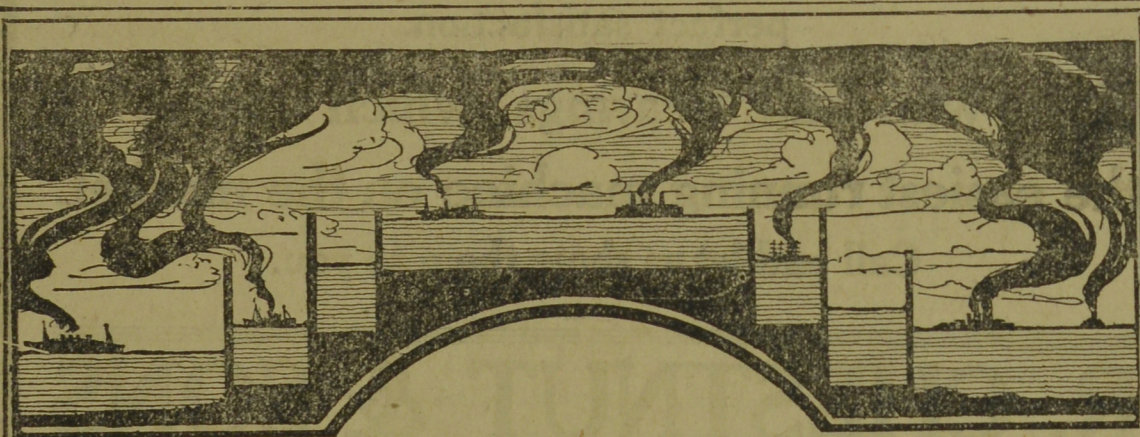

PREPARING CAVIAR

This Was a Russian Industry Many Years Ago

Preparing caviar for commercial purposes appears to have been a well-established business centuries ago, for a writer of long ago made this curious announcement: "It is made of roes of two different fishes which are caught in the River Volga, but especially near the city of Astrachan, the sturgeon and the belluga. The sturgeon is well known, but the belluga is a large fish about twelve or fifteen feet long, without scales, not unlike a sturgeon, but larger and incomparably more luxurious, his belly being as tender as marrow and his flesh whiter than veal, whence he is called the white fish by Europeans. This belluga lies in the bottom of the river at certain seasons and swallows many large pebbles of great weight to ballast himself against the force of the stream of the Volga, augmented by the melting of the snows in the spring. When the waters are assuaged he disgorges himself. Near the Astrachan they catch sometimes such a quantity that they throw away the flesh, though the daintiest of all fish, reserving only the spawn, of which they sometimes take 150 to 200 pounds' weight out of one fish. These roes they salt and press and put into cakes if it is to be sent abroad, else they keep it impressed, only a little covered with salt."
