GRONDIN CASE

Grondin's death accepted the note as genuine and reported that her death was due to "asphyxiation with suicidal intent."

FATHER INVESTIGATED.

When Mr. Daviau, father of the dead woman, learned of the note, he immediately began an investigation. About the same time there arrived here from Maine a widow in whom Grondin was said to be interested. This led the authorities to re-open the case. Meanwhile Grondin was put under surveillance and was arrested when the district attorney announced that poison had been found in Mrs. Grondin's body, which was exhumed a week or ten days ago.

GHOST STORY.

The day after Grondin's arrest his attorneys caused something of a sensation by declaring that the "third degree," with a "ghost" as the central figure, had been applied by the police in a futile attempt to obtain a confession from the accused husband. The police denied that they had used the so-called third degree on Grondin.

Attorneys say that when the case comes to trial it will be a battle between handwriting experts who have examined the "suicide note" which Grondin alleges his wife wrote. Of two handwriting experts who examined the note one declared positively that it had been written by Grondin while the other was equally positive that it had been written by Mrs. Grondin. One of the experts represented the prosecution and the other the defence.

had been several years ago. Ald. Mitchell said that it was before he was chairman of the Road Committee.

Mrs. Harvey said that Prof. Miller of the U.N.B. was working out a system by which the trees of the city would be protected. The delegation then presented a largely signed petition to the effect that the care of the trees of the city be placed in the charge of the U.N.B. Forestry Department. Upwards of four hundred rate payers signed the petition.

His Worship Mayor Hooper said that the petition would receive every consideration. This matter of protection and shade-trees had been before every council for the past nine years to his knowledge. The city already had opened negotiations with Prof. Miller.

LIGHTS FOR NORMAL SCHOOL.

The city has an offer from the Provincial Minister of Public Works to place electric lights around the Normal School, similar to those around the Barracks and the Officers' Quarters, on condition that the city pays for the current used. The matter is under consideration by the City Council.

USUAL DISCUSSION.

The usual discussion about the payment for the city clerk's residence telephone took place in the City Council committee meeting last night. Ald. Farrell held the item up. After discussion it was passed. The City Clerk said the telephone had been installed some years ago by order of the council.

The minister of marine declared that he had done a good deal for the improvement of fishing conditions since he came to office and was pretty well satisfied with himself for what he had done. He would look into the representations which had been made.

191 QUERIES.

Ottawa, Feb. 2.—The government was confronted with a series of 191 questions standing on the order paper when House opened this afternoon. Nearly all of them were from opposition members desiring information as to the government's legislative plans, as to various administrative acts and as to the government's views generally on a number of subjects of either local or general interest. Most of the questions were answered but in most cases where information was desired as to legislative intentions the replies were non-committal.

VALLEY RAILWAY TO ANDOVER.

Mr. Michaud was told by the minister of railways that the subsidy act of 1910 provided subsidy for a line from St. John to Grand Falls, that the act of 1913 provided a subsidy only from St. John to Andover that there is no settled policy, that the line will not be extended to Grand Falls.

RAMMEY MOOSIE, YOUNG SYRIAN SERIOUSLY HURT

Rammey Moosie, a young Syrian living in St. Mary's while selling papers yesterday afternoon narrowly escaped serious injury. He like other boys had the habit of sliding down the banister of the winding stair in the Court House. He was doing this when he lost his hold and fell down the well alighting on his back. One of the persons in the building hearing the noise of the fall rushed out and found young Moosie lying on the floor. It was at first thought he had broken his spine but the physician in charge stated this morning that no bones had been broken but that he was badly shaken up. He will be confined to his bed for several days.

DEATH AT GEARY

Mrs. Melvin Carr died at her home at Geary yesterday afternoon. Death was due to cancer. The deceased was aged sixty-nine years. Her husband, one daughter and three sisters survive. They are, Mrs. George Stennicks and Mrs. Samuel Currie, of Geary and Mrs. Reuben Carr of Victoria, B.C. The funeral will take place at Geary on Wednesday afternoon. Service will be held at the late home of the deceased at one o'clock by Rev. Mr. M. Corey.

EARLY SPRING EXPECTED

A number of people saw a robin on a tree in front of Mr. W. L. Jennings on Brunswick Street, Sunday morning. Robins around at this time of year are generally taken as a sign of an early spring.

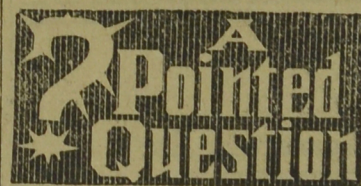
