and also the homestead.

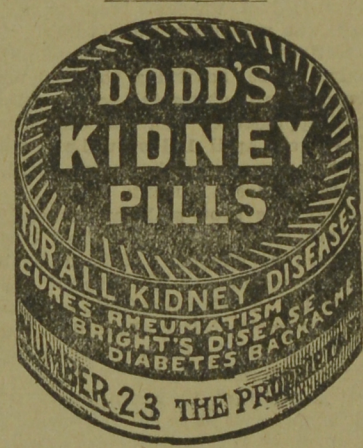

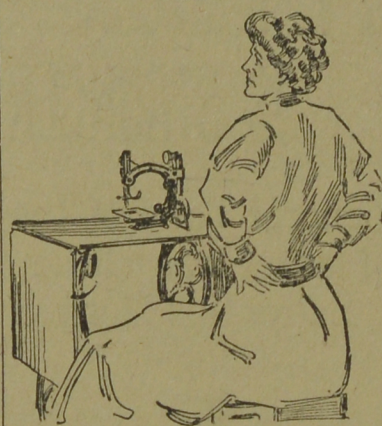
### STREETS THE SCHOOL CHAIR THE RESULT
