DEATH AT ST. MARY'S

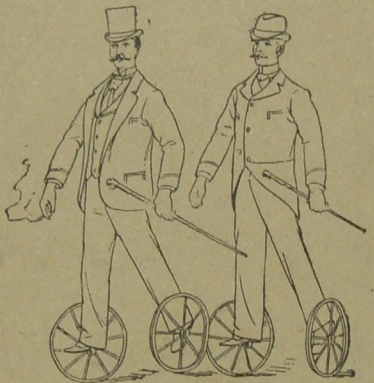

G. W. MASSEY DIED SUDDENLY FRIDAY IN DETROIT, MICH.

Three Daughters Survive, Living in This City—Deceased Formerly Was Manager of Bank of Montreal Branch Here

Miss Marjorie Massey of this city last evening received sad tidings by telegram from Detroit, Mich., the message containing the intelligence that her father, G. W. Massey, formerly manager of the Bank of Montreal's branch in Fredericton had died suddenly Friday afternoon. Details were lacking. It is probable that the funeral will take place at Detroit.

The late Mr. Massey is survived by a widow, and an infant son and three daughters and one son by his first marriage. The daughters are the Misses Marjorie, Muriel and Doris of this city. His son William who was recently transferred from Perth to Lunenburg, N.S., in the service of the Bank of Montreal was here a few days ago.

The deceased was about forty-eight years old and was a native of Ireland. He came to Canada when a young man and entered the service of the Bank of Montreal at St. John. About five years ago he was transferred here from Chatham, Ont., as manager. While at Chatham he was connected with the militia holding the rank of major. News of his death has been received here with general regret as he was a very popular man.

Miss Muriel Massey second daughter of the deceased is to be married on Wednesday next to W. M. McKee manager of the Bank of Commerce at Radfield, Sask., formerly of Fredericton. Mr. McKee is now on his way to Fredericton arriving in Montreal yesterday.

DAVID WITHROW SEVERELY HURT IN SEWER CAVE-IN

Buried to His Chin in Earth and Had Shoulder Broken—Road Department Will Close Streets to Avoid Accidents

David Withrow an employe of the city public works department had a narrow escape from death yesterday afternoon when the walls of an excavation caved in for a catch basin at the corner of Charlotte and Regent Street in which he was working caved in on him. He was buried to the chin in earth and only by a miracle escaped death by suffocation. He is now confined to his bed under the care of Dr. McNally and is suffering from a broken shoulder blade.

The cave-in occurred shortly after four o'clock and was caused by a heavy wagon being driven close to the edge of the excavation. Fore-George Clark was in charge of the work. Contractor J. M. Chappell's crew was laying curb and gutter on Regent Street and members of it on seeing Withrow's predicament went to his assistance and dug him out.

Road Commissioner H. C. Jewett stated today that the accident had compelled the Roads and Streets Department to make the rule to close all streets where excavation is being being made. In the past drives of horses have insisted on driving close to the edge of excavations and have resented any instructions on the part of the department employes. Traffic will be stopped altogether in the future.

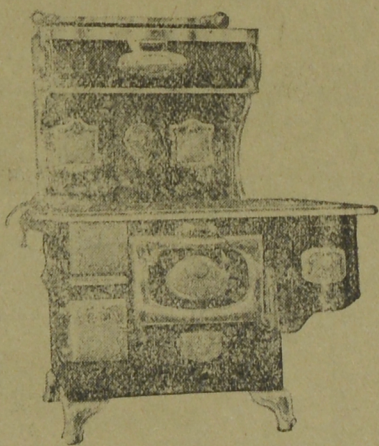
