SIGHTED EACH OTHER
WHEN FAR APART.

"The vessels sighted each other when far apart. The Empress of Ireland was seen off the port bow of the Storstadt. The Empress of Ireland's green, or starboard light, was visible to those on the Storstadt. Under these circumstances the rules of navigation gave the Storstadt the right of way.

"The heading of the Empress was then changed in such a manner as to put the vessels in a position to pass safely. Shortly after a fog enveloped first the Empress and then the Storstadt.

"Fog signals were exchanged. The Storstadt's engines were at once slowed and then stopped. Her heading remained unaltered. Whistles from the Empress were heard on the Storstadt's port bows and were answered. The Empress of Ireland was then seen through the fog close at hand, on the port bow of the Storstadt. She was showing her green light and was making considerable headway.

"The engines of the Storstadt were at once reversed at full speed, and her headway was nearly checked when the vessels came together.

TRIED TO HOLD TO EMPRESS.

"It has been said that the Storstadt should not have backed out of the hole made by the collision. She did not do so. As the vessels came together the Storstadt's engines were ordered ahead for the purpose of holding her bow against the side of the Empress and thus preventing the entrance of water into either vessel.

"The headway of the Empress, however, swung the Storstadt around in such a way as to twist the Storstadt's bow out of the hole and to bend the bow itself over to port.

"The Empress at once disappeared in the fog. The Storstadt sounded her whistle repeatedly in an effort to locate the Empress of Ireland but could obtain no indication of her whereabouts until cries were heard. The Storstadt was then manoeuvred as close to the Empress as was safe, in view of the danger of injury to the persons who were already in the water.

LOWERED EVERY BOAT.

"The Storstadt at once lowered every one of her boats and sent them to save the passengers and crew of the Empress, though she herself was in serious danger of sinking. When two boats from the Empress reached the Storstadt, the Storstadt's men also manned these boats and went in them to the rescue. Her own boats made several trips and in all about 350 persons were taken on board and everything that the ship's stores contained was utilized for their comfort. The clothes of those on the Storstadt were placed at the disposal of the rescued ones and every assistance was rendered.

"The statements which have appeared in the press, indicating that there was the slightest delay on the part of the Storstadt in rendering prompt and efficient aid, do a cruel injustice to the captain, who did not hesitate to send out every boat he had, in spite of the desperate condition of his own ship.

"The owners of the Storstadt asked of the public that, in all fairness to both vessels and their commanders, judgment as to where the blame for this terrible disaster should rest, be suspended until an impartial tribunal has heard the evidence of both sides."

The seizure of the Storstadt was at the instance of the C.P.R. company, whose claim against the owners of the collier, the Maritime Steamship Company of Norway, is for \$2,000,000 loss. There may be a further claim by the C.P.R. for loss of cargo. The owners of the Storstadt will, it is understood, put up bonds tomorrow so that the vessel may be released. No inconvenience will be caused by the arrest as in the meantime the Storstadt will be unloading her cargo and re-loading.

NUMBER LOST

Montreal, May 31—It is impossible still to make a final estimate of the number of people saved or drowned in the wreck of the Empress of Ireland. So far as the lists furnished by the C. P. R. Company in Montreal go, it would seem that the total loss of life is 969. Following is the count, based on the latest C.P.R. list:

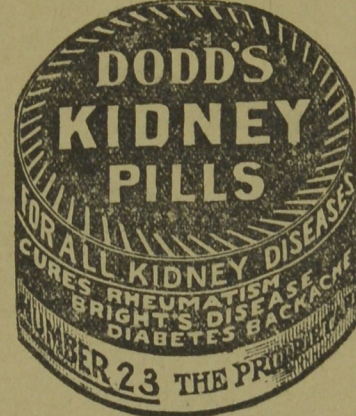
LOBSTER FACTORIES COMBINING IN P. E. I.

Charlottetown, P. E. I. June 1—The lobster fishing season is now in full swing in this Province and from present indications it will be more successful season than last year, the lobsters being more plentiful and much larger. The season this year for the great part of the coast has been shortened ten days and will close on June 10.

The importance of the lobster industry in Prince Edward Island may be judged from the fact that last year, the pack was valued at \$750,000. Of late there has been a strong tendency toward the consolidation of the factories. In several sections, nine and ten factories have merged into one. The expense has been reduced by closing the smaller factories and doing all the packing in the largest factory of each group. POPE PIUS

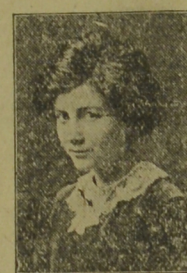
