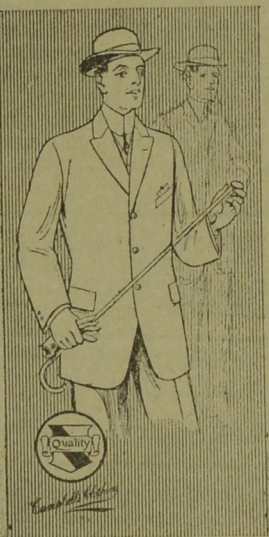

CROWD THOUGHT LANGFORD HAD DRAW WITH WILLS

Newspapers Gave Local Man Decision
at New Orleans--Big Crowd
Saw Bout

New Orleans, La., May 1--Sam Langford of Boston, and Harry Wills of New Orleans, tonight fought ten rounds at the National Baseball Park before the largest crowd that has seen a bout since the Sullivan-Corbett meeting of 1892. Although the greater number of the fans thought the fight a draw, the Times-Picayune will give Wills the shade.

Wills had the better of the argument in the first four rounds, but Langford's great ring experience stood him in good stead and in the fifth, sixth and seventh he evened up. The eighth was all Langford and in the ninth he all but had Wills out. The latter showed wonderful recuperative power and came back strong in the tenth.

QUIMET'S FAILURE CAUSES VARYING PRESS COMMENT

English Papers Say Yankee Golf Champion was Very Nervous--Some Critics Say He Can Come Back Despite His Poor Showing at Sunningdale

London, Mat 1--The London papers this morning criticize Francis Ouimet the American open golf champion for his miserable failure to make a high class showing yesterday in his first important engagement at Sunningdale where he was defeated by the English champion Hilton, in the competition for the Illustrated Golf gold vase.

The Standard says: "He was nervous, although they tell us it is a complaint from which he never suffers. We feel sure he has temperament for the game. His large mobile mouth, and frank, open countenance lights up constantly with an attractive smile, indicate good temper. His eyes are calm and steady and his smooth keen face, set in firm lines, shows grit and determination."

The Morning Post says: "Ouimet

is wont, on many occasions to put himself too frequently into trouble with his driver. Obviously he has a wide and deep knowledge of the iron clubs, when his putting in rapid without hast, bold without rashness. None but a first class golfer, one might even say a great golfer could have played so destructively as he did at times, and yet return two 83's. It must be remembered that the change in weather were all against him."

The Daily Telegraph says: "It looks like a bad failure when a man who is the open champion of America and beat Vardon and Ray cannot get into the first fifteen players in a competition like this. Yet he is still a fine golfer. The circumstances under which he was tried yesterday were hard. He was paired with Hilton, making this couple the star attraction of the day."

MARITIME LEAGUE MEETING IS BEING HELD IN ST. JOHN

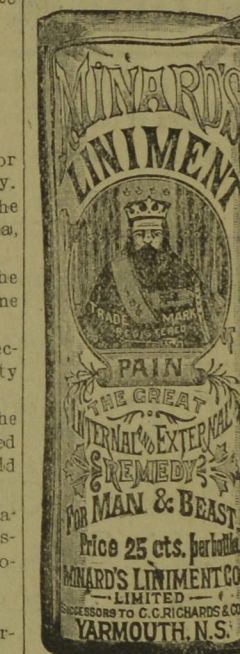
Announcement Concerning Prospects of League Will be Made Tonight
