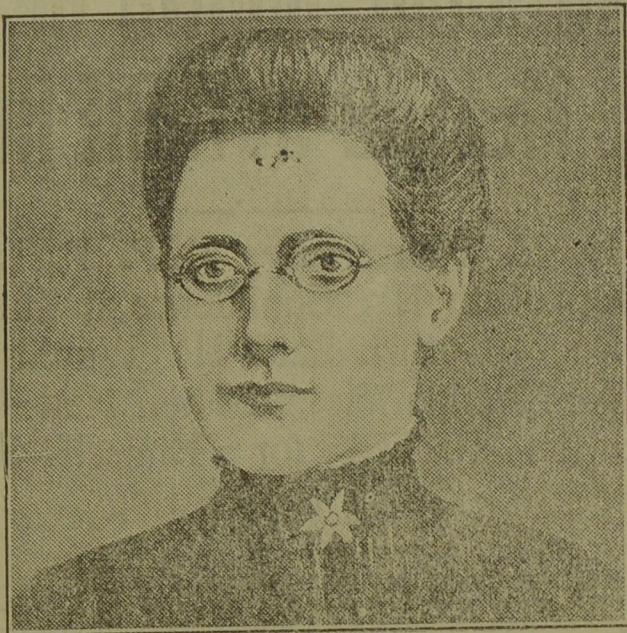

PRAYERS FOR RAIN

Complete Performance of Rite Has
Brought on a Flood

During long droughts prayers are offered for rain in Japanese villages; in some districts big fires are lighted on the mountains at night as an additional invocation, while the peasantry engage in united petition for a break in the long spell of dry weather.

In the village of Inano more strenuous methods prevail. Not far from the place is a waterfall at the head of the River Namase, a big rock of curious shape being beside the basin. The villagers proceed to the waterfall in a row, leading a horse, which animal, by the way, must be white with black spots. Reaching the basin they put the horse on the rock and read out a prayer for rain.

When the last word has been read one of the number should cut off the head of the horse with a sword, so that it falls into the basin, if the old-time custom were completely followed. Nowadays, however, they only make a small cut, and getting a little blood from the unfortunate horse paint the rock with it. According to old villagers, a number of years ago the rite was enforced in all its gruesomeness, a horse being killed, with the result that heavy rain set in at once, but it rained so much that there was a serious flood.

She leaves a sorrowing father and mother and nine sisters, Edna, Vera, Roxy, Elsie, Leona, Henrietta, Carolyn, Melba and Ruby all at home. To these the sympathy of the community goes out.

Many were the floral tributes which showed the esteem in which she was held.

The funeral took place from her late home Sunday at two o'clock. Service was conducted by Rev. Mr. Shewan assisted by Rev. Mr. Colpitts. Interment being made at Low-ville Kingsclear, Baptist Cemetery. It was one of the largest funerals ever seen in Kingsclear. The Lower Kingsclear Baptist choir rendered the following hymns "Nearer My God to Thee," "Asleep in Jesus," "Safe in the Arms of Jesus," Rock of Ages and "Meet Me There."

FRESTON TOWER

Each Storey Was Designed For A
Specific Purpose

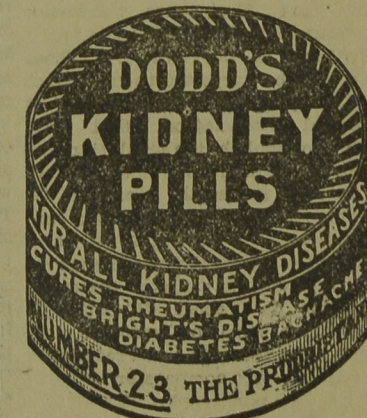
At Freston, near Ipswich, stands a picturesque building known as Freston Tower, which was constructed under somewhat romantic circumstances. The owner of the estate upon which the tower stands was Lord de Freston whose beautiful daughter, Ellen, possessed intellectual abilities of a high order. Fearing that intellectual achievements would be attained at the expense of her natural graces and beauty, advice was tendered to the anxious Lord de Freston to "build a tower six stories high, each one with purpose known." Accordingly Freston Tower was erected as a place of study and recreation for the gentle Ellen de Freston. The six storeys of Freston Tower were originally designed for the following purposes: Lower room for the dispensation of charity from seven to eight o'clock; the second room for working tapestry and fancy work from nine till ten; the third for music from ten to noon; the fourth for painting from twelve to one; the fifth for literature from one till two; and the sixth and highest for the study of astronomy and the heavens in the evening. It will thus be seen that Ellen's pursuits and occupations were much diversified. Beautiful scenery is visible from the tower, which overlooks the River Orwell.

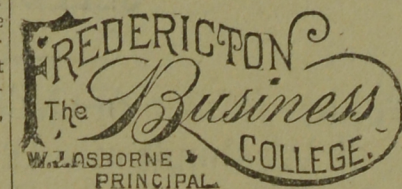

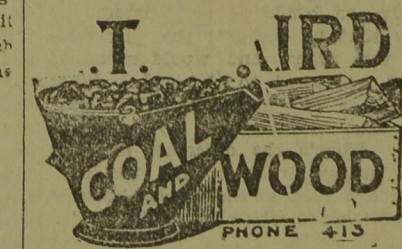
