

NEWS OF FREDERICTON TWENTY-ONE YEARS AGO

(From the Weekly Herald Saturday, Taylor of Sunbury County, and was February 11, 1893.)

NEW ENTERPRISE:—A company with a fair share of capital and considerable activity has been formed for the purpose of developing the coal field of New Brunswick. This company will ask for legislation at the next session of Parliament to enable them to construct railway and wharf facilities at Grand Lake and for the owning and conducting of all necessary vessels for the shipment of the product.

NASHWAAK BRIDGE:—The work of tearing down the old bridge at mouth of the Nashwaak is being pushed on. It is a difficult work as some of the piers have to be torn out down to the foundation. They have been built upwards of twenty-five years, and are filled with sand and clay washed in by the river. This clay is frozen solid and is very difficult to remove. Dynamite has been used but with little effect as it found escape between the logs. But however the top-work is all done and some of the foundation is ready for rebuilding.

LATE MRS. SCHOOL BURNED:—At seven o'clock Wednesday the village school in No. 3 district, Stanley, was destroyed by fire. All the scholar's books and belongings were destroyed but part of the furniture was saved. The insurance loss was \$450. A new building will be erected at once.

AT BLACKVILLE:—Alex. Gibson has about 2,000,000 feet of logs at his Blackville mill and will probably increase the amount to 3,000,000 by the close of the winter. This will ensure a good summer's sawing. A large furnace has been built to burn the refuse from the mill.

PRINCE WILLIAM FIRE:—The dwelling house of Abraham Hoyt at Prince William was destroyed by fire on Sunday morning last. There was no one in the house when the fire broke out. Part of the furniture was saved. The loss was at \$1200.

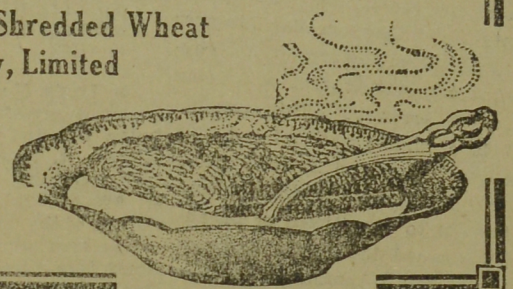

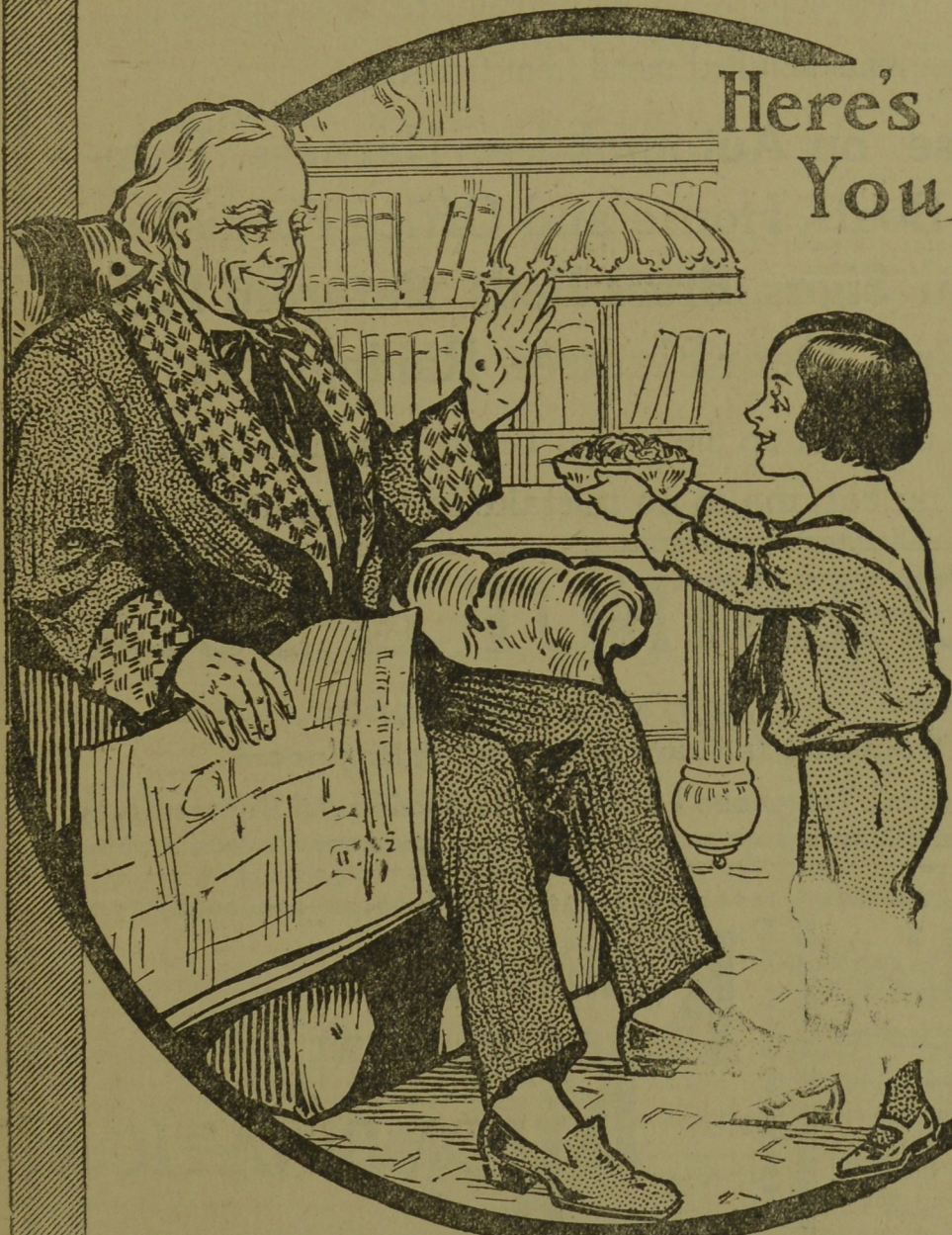
