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"GIVE THE BOY A CHANCE"

This is the ringing argument Mr. McLeod made at the Court House on nomination day to elect his man, Guthrie. Certainly give the boy a chance—give him all the chances going, but is that any reason why nobody else should have a chance? The "boy" has had chances and mighty good ones. He "came up from the woods and the drives" says McLeod, and all credit to him. Some jobs waited his arrival. A grateful country and a favorable government made him clerk of the County Court where he pulls in about five hundred dollars a year. Not satisfied the government appointed him engraving clerk at the Parliament Buildings and pays him another three or four hundred dollars for a month's work during the session of the legislature. For about twenty-five dollars per day he agrees to do the legal business of the government corporation that is building the Valley Railway. This appointment is a further mark of gratitude by a grateful government and "gives the boy a chance." Guthrie offered his services to the citizens of his adopted town and became an alderman. In due course he became head of the Police Commission. Owing to the remarkable difficulty to buy a drink when he held down this job and the scarcity of rum-shops he became tangled up between the Temperance people and the liquor interests. Believing his valuable services were not being properly appreciated he amputated himself from this job a few days before the citizens would have performed the operation. Mr. McLeod and Guthrie called a convention and to "give the boy a chance," he nominated himself for the legislature. It made no difference that a substantial citizen who had fought the battles of the Tory party before Guthrie was born and since, who never had any public pap, was also a candidate. Turn him down! What a preposterous idea that anybody should have any chance but Guthrie!

Coun. Harry Smith's activity on behalf of Mr. P. A. Guthrie's candidature is not difficult to explain. He is a member of the company which owns the dredge Tantawanta, purchased just after the last Federal election at an advance of one hundred per cent on the cost price. Mr. Guthrie is the secretary-treasurer of the company. The dredge has been an unprofitable investment so far but with Mr. McLeod in the Federal Parliament it is thought that there are better times ahead.

The back organ claims that Mr. Pinder gave the government a note for \$1100 in exchange for a Kentucky spindle lever and neglected to pay the same on maturity. If this is true Mr. Pinder probably acted on the principle that no value had been received.

Ex-ald. Guthrie boastfully declares that in this contest he is going to have the support of "brawny Liberals" who opposed him in previous elections. The only Liberals who are supporting Ex-Ald. Guthrie are those who attach more importance to civic politics than they do to Local or Federal.

According to the back organ Mr. Scott's meetings are very frosty, while those being addressed by great orators like Col. McLeod, Capt. Guthrie, John A. Young, Dr. Mullin and Coun. Harry Smith are large and enthusiastic. The back organists at its old game of misrepresentation.

The local back organ which has been boasting all along that its patron saint, El-Ald. Guthrie is going to have a walk over in this election, seems to have become thoroughly alarmed over the outlook. In its issue of last evening it devotes fourteen columns of space to abuse of Mr. Pinder and others who are supporting Mr. Scott.

Col. McLeod should use his influence with Col. Sam Hughes to have Mr. John A. Young, M.P.P., as an honorary colonel in order that he might be permitted to wear a uniform. At the present time his picture, when published in the back organ, alongside those of Col. McLeod and Capt. Guthrie, with their dazzling uniforms of scarlet and gold, has a decidedly sad and lonely appearance.

A comparison of the list of nominees of the two candidates for the local bye-election as published, would seem to indicate that Mr. Scott has decidedly the best of the argument.

According to the back organ the honest and business like Flemming administration seems to have permitted Mr. Pinder to put one over on it.

It is strange that Premier Fleming should permit a government official to leave his work in the departmental building, go to the court house on nomination day and deliberately interrupt Conservative speakers. It looks as if almost anything may happen under Flemming rule.

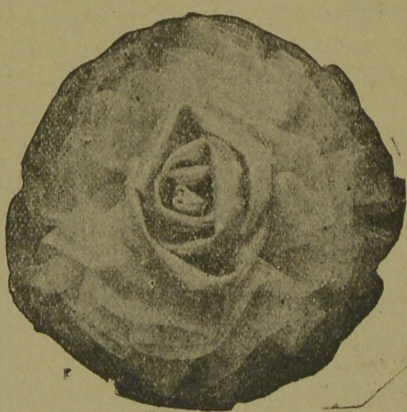
