FAKE SURVEY FOR FOR CONCRETE WARVES ABRUPTLY STOPPED

Hon. Bob Rogers Knows Nothing About McLeod's Promise—"Survey Party" Jeered at by Crowd This Morning

A "fake" survey was carried out this morning for the new concrete wharves which H. F. McLeod, M. P. promised at the opening of the bye-election campaign in this county. The survey was carried out by a number of young men who are known to be strong supporters of McLeod and Guthrie. They caused quite a bit of excitement and would have probably got along all right had the St. John morning papers not contained announcements that the Hon. Robert Rogers, minister of public works, denied the statement that he had promised H. F. McLeod to have the wharves built at Fredericton. The young surveyors made a hasty retreat because of the jeers of the spectators who were aware of the real state of affairs.

ARM DISLOCATED BY GASOLINE ENGINE AT KINGSCLEAR

David Johnson Had Narrow Escape From Serious Injury—Mitten Came off and Bad Injury Was Averted

Mr. David Johnson a native of Scotland who lately purchased a farm of Mr. G. Alex. Murray of Kingsclear narrowly escaped serious injury at his home yesterday morning. He was cutting stove wood by means of a gasoline engine when the belt started to come off. Mr. Johnson tried to push it on while the wheel was in motion and got his arm caught between the belt and the wheel. The only thing which saved him from serious injury was the mitten which was torn violently off by the revolving belt and he pulled his hand free. Mr. Johnson's arm was dislocated at the shoulder and Dr. S. F. A. Wainwright was called in to attend him.

Mr. Johnson considers himself very lucky and it is expected that he will be recovered in a short time.
