### FRICK FAMILY MOVE INTO NEW MANSION

New York, Nov. 16 — Henry C. Frick's \$2,000,000\home in Fifth ave, between Seventieth and Seventy-first sts., is ready for his occupancy. Todai he began to move, thereby bring ing to a close his nine years' occup-ancy of the William H. Vanderbilt house at 640 Fifth Ave.

Construction of the Frick house has been under way for two years. It occupies the site of the old Lenox Lifor which Mr. Frick paid \$2,400,000 in 1903, and which has a depth of one hundred and seventy-five feet, with a Fifth Ave. frontage of

200 feet. At Seventy-first st., Mr. Frick's office and his art gallery carry the structure to the Fifth ave. line, the rest of it stands back a distance of 75 feet this "front yard" being given over to a sunken pool and an Italian

The art gallery, which will embrace 3500 square feet, is the distinctive feature of the house. It will compain the pictures that the steel man has been gathering for the last twenty five years, and whose total purchase price he alone knows. It is probable however, that the collection cost him more than \$10,000,000.

One of the features of the new establishment are the thirteen horse chestnut trees along Fifth avenue. None of these trees was less than 30 years old when they were transplanted a year ago from Germantown, Philadelphia. To give them proper soil it was necessary to blast out solid rock to the depth of six feet, the soil itself being brought from Long Is-




