COL. JOHN L. MARSH HAS PASSED AWAY

the city until 1870, when he was appointed city clerk. After serving in that capacity for a few months, he resigned and was appointed police magistrate, a position which he held continuously until July of the present year, when he retired and was granted a pension of \$700 per annum. The deceased was Fredericton's oldest ex-alderman, having served in the council for several terms during the early sixties. As police magistrate he gave close attention to his duties and tried many important cases. He was the first magistrate to try a Scott Act case and also the first to sentence a prisoner direct to the penitentiary from the police court. He had a good knowledge of law and his decisions were rarely interfered with by the higher courts. In dealing out justice in criminal cases he always tempered it with mercy.

A MILITARY MAN.

Col. Marsh had a long and honorable connection with the active militia, joining the York county volunteers when a young man. He served as an officer under the late Hon. Lemuel Allan Wilmot and held a Fenian Raid medal. When the 71st York Regt. was organized in 1869 he was given the rank of major in the corps and a few months later, on the retirement of Lieut. Col. Hewitson, he succeeded him as commandant with the rank of lieutenant colonel. He held this position until 1895, when he retired, retaining rank.

It was Col. Marsh who gave the word of command to the local volunteers of the first contingent when they left Fredericton for Valcartier.

Col. Marsh had a very large circle of acquaintances and was highly respected in the community. He was of a sociable disposition, was a good story teller and was possessed of a keen sense of humor. He had a good memory and was a very entertaining conversationalist. He was always conspicuous figure at gatherings of a military nature and frequently made his appearance at banquets, where he was always a congenial spirit. He was looked upon as one of the links which connected the present with the good old days of long ago and filled an important place in the life of the community.

The deceased was eighty-five years of age and is survived by two daughters, Mrs. G. E. Powers of Cambridge and Miss Mary Marsh at home. One sister, Mrs. McIntosh, resides at Kingsclear. His wife, who was formerly Miss Frink of Nashua, N.H., predeceased him by many years. Lieut. Col. McLean, M.P., of St. John, is a nephew.

The funeral will take place on Sunday afternoon at three o'clock from his late home on George street. Rev. Thomas Marshall will conduct the service. The members of the civic corporation and the local bar will attend the obsequies.

story does not agree with Mr. Berry's version.

Mr. Brantley did not attempt to explain why, after getting a check for \$2,903.32 from the Dalhousie Lumber Company Mr. Berry not only did not report the collection to the crown lands department but sent out from that office another statement to the Dalhousie people reducing their account so that it would appear in the books of Colonel Loggie's office that they had only paid \$19,419.15 and \$137.13, stumping on 5,486 sleepers, whereas on August 20th they had paid an additional \$2,903.32, which did not go into the provincial revenue.

Mr. Carter says Mr. Brantley called the transaction "irregular," but was explicit in his statement that Premier Flemming knew all about it.

Mr. Flemming, Mr. Brantley and Mr. Berry were three of the gentlemen who met in a certain room in the Barker House, Fredericton—and that interview was impressed upon the people by the Royal Commission's report, published yesterday.

SUCCESSFUL HUNTERS

THE COUNTY MARKET

There was a fairly large country market this morning, most of the farmers bringing their produce to the city in sleds. Eggs sold at from 10 to 42 cents per dozen and butter was selling at from 28 to 30 cents per pound. Chickens brought from 60 cents to \$1.25 per pair, and geese sold at \$1 each. Potatoes were selling at from 90 cents to \$1 per barrel and apples brought all the way from 75 cents to \$1.50 per barrel.

The postponed meeting of the general committee of the local branch of the Canadian Patriotic Fund was held last evening in the Board of Trade Office, Queen street. Mayor Mitchell presided and those present included Lord Ashburnham, Judge Crockett, Judge Barry, Judge Wilson, Dr. T. C. Allen, ex-Ald. John J. Weddall and Messrs. J. T. Jennings, James S. Neill, R. B. VanDine, F. B. Edgecombe, W. E. Farrell, J. J. McCaffrey, W. G. Clark and A. R. Slipp, M.P.P.

His Honor Lieut. Governor Wood was in attendance and delivered a short address on the functions of the Provincial Patriotic Committee.

The committee confirmed the resolution regarding the affiliation of the local fund with the Dominion Fund, which was passed on Sept. 9th.

Mr. Robt. FitzRandolph, for the Relief Committee, reported that four new applications for assistance were considered at the last meeting and the sum of \$45 granted to two families residing in this city.

The report of Dr. T. C. Allen, the secretary, showed that the sum of \$11,375, is now deposited in the bank in this city to the credit of the committee.

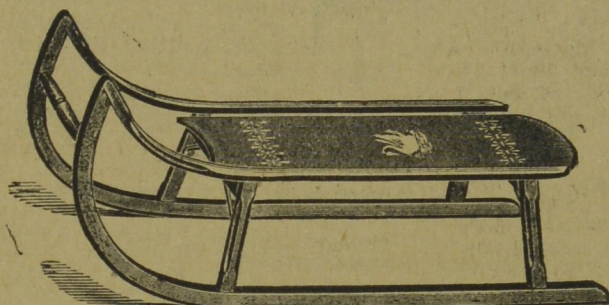
