

As police magistrate he gave close attention to his duties and tried many important cases, He was the first magistrate to try a cott Act case and also the first to sentence a prisoner direct to the penitentiary from the police court. He had a good knowledge of law and his decisions were rarely interfered with by the higher courts. In dealing out justice in criminal cases he always tempered it with mercy.

Col. Marsh had a long and honorble connection with the active militia, joining the York county volunteers when a young man. He inst served as an officer under the late Hon. Lemuel Allan Wilmot and held a Fenian Raid medal. When the 71st York Regt. was organized in 1869 he vas given the rank of major in the corps and a few months later, on the retirement of Lieut. Col. Hewitson, he succeeded him as commandant with the rank of lieutenant colonel. He held this position until 1895, when he retired, retaining rank.
