## COL. JOHN L. MARSH HAS CLOSED HIS EARTHLY CAREER.

Veteran ex-Police Magistrate Succumbs to an Attack of Pneumonia---One of Fredericton's Oldest Citizens---His Career.

The death occurred at his home on George street last evening of Lieut. Col. John Lathrop Marsh, K.C., one of Fredericton's most widely known citizens. He had been in the enjoyment of his usual good health up to a week ago, when he was stricken down with an attack of pneumonia. On account of his advanced age it became apparent to the attending physician that he had no chance for recovery. He relapsed into unconsciousness some hours before his death. Although the news that he was no more did not create surprise it was received on all sides with expressions of regret.

The late Col. Marsh was born in the Parish of Simonds, Carleton county, but the greater part of his long life was spent in this city, his parents having moved here when he was quite young. His father, the late John L. Marsh, for many years carried on a milling business in the west end of the city. Col. Marsh was educated in the common schools of this city and took a course at the University of New Brunswick, graduating with the degree of B.A. in 1892. At the time of his death he was the oldest graduate of the institution. He studied law with the late Hon. Charles Fisher and was admitted an attorney of the Supreme Court in April, 1893, and a barrister in October of the following year. In June, 1907, he was created one of Her Majesty's counsel learned in the law. He practised his profession in

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## TWO YEAR OLD BOY DIED AT HOSPITAL FROM INJURIES

Little Son of Fred Barnes Was Fatally Scalded at His Home at Victoria Mills---Fell Into a Basin Of Hot Water

George Barnes, the two year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Barnes, died at the Victoria Hospital this morning as a result of injuries received from being scalded in a basin of hot water at the home of the parents at Victoria Mills yesterday.

From what can be learned several small children were playing about the kitchen at the Barnes home yesterday morning and in some way upset the little child out of a high chair into a basin of hot water which was standing on a table near by. The infant was badly burned about the face, head and chest and suffered intense pain. Dr. W. J. Weaver was summoned and he had the injured child taken to the Victoria Hospital yesterday afternoon. Everything possible was done to save the little life but the child passed away at an early hour this morning. Besides the parents, who formerly resided in Lancastershire, England, three sisters, Lizzie, Annie and Mary, all at home, survive to mourn the loss. The father is at present working in the lumber woods a few miles from Millville, York County.
