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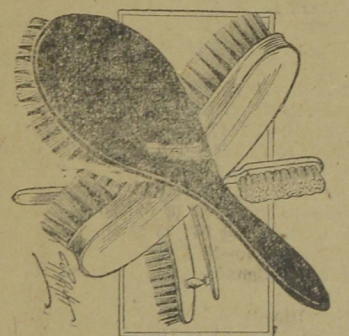

CLUB WOMEN GATHER AT SAN FRANCISCO

San Francisco, Calif., June 25—
 Several thousand club women, rep-
 resenting women's clubs of every de-
 scription and in every section of the
 country are gathered here to attend
 the eleventh biennial convention of
 the General Federation of Women's
 Clubs, which formally opened here
 today and will continue in session
 until July 5. The gathering of dele-
 gates is by far the largest which
 ever attended one of these biennial
 conventions and, judging from the
 elaborate program, the numerous
 prominent speakers scheduled to ad-
 dress the convention and the intense
 interest shown by the attending de-
 legates, the biennial which opened
 today promises to exceed in impor-
 tance all previous gatherings of the
 federation.

Today's program does not include
 a business session. The afternoon
 reception was planned to give the
 delegates an opportunity to become
 acquainted with one another and with
 the general officers of the federation.
 In the evening meeting at the Sutter
 Street Pavilion the visiting delegates
 will be welcomed by Mrs. E. G.
 Denniston, president of the local
 board, and other officials and a num-
 ber of responses will be made by
 leading delegates. The first business
 session will be held at the Sutter
 Street Pavilion tomorrow morning
 when the president of the federation,
 Mrs. Philip N. Moore, of St. Louis,
 will submit her report. The rest of
 the session will be devoted to the
 reading of various committee re-
 ports. Mrs. O. Shepard Barnum,
 chairman of the department of edu-
 cation, will read a paper.

The election of officers and direc-
 tors of the federation will be held on
 Wednesday afternoon, July 3, and in
 the mean time a great deal of cam-
 paign work will be done by the can-
 didates for the principal offices and
 their friends. Particularly interest-
 ing is the contest for the presidency,
 with two candidates in the field, Mrs.
 Philip Carpenter, a noted New York
 club woman, and Mrs. Percy V. Pen-
 nybacker, of Austin, Tex., who has
 many friends among the southern and
 western delegates.

The program for the convention is
 elaborate and unusually interesting.
 Edward H. Gross, president of the
 National Soil Fertility League, will
 be one of the speakers on conserva-
 tion night, and Overton W. Price of
 Washington, a friend of Mr. Gifford
 Pinchot, will speak on forestry. Mrs.
 A. Barton Miller, president of the
 Women's Rivers' and Harbors' Con-
 gress, is also scheduled for an ad-
 dress. William Hard will speak at
 the legislative session on "Women
 and the Law." Moral teaching in
 schools will be discussed by Prof.
 Maria Sanford of the University of
 Minnesota. Carolina Bartlett Crane
 will discuss municipal housekeeping
 at one of the morning sessions.

At the conferences various impor-
 tant subjects will be discussed by no-
 ted speakers. Miss Laura Drake Gill,
 president of the College of Women at
 Suwanee, Tenn., University of the
 South, will speak on vocational guid-
 ance for girls. Mrs. Inogen B. Oak-
 ley will speak on civil service; Mrs.
 E. W. Pattison on art and art edu-
 cation; Miss Helen V. Boswell on
 industrial and social conditions; Mrs.
 Olaf N. Guldin, on household econo-
 mics; Mrs. George Zimmerman on
 civics; Mrs. Frances Squire Potter
 on literature and library extension;
 Mrs. Lawrence MaxRell on music and
 musical training; Mrs. C. Crockett
 on public health; Mrs. H. N. Bush-
 nell, on legislation; Dr. Jessica Pei-
 xotta of the University of Colorado,
 and Mrs. Sarah Platt Decker on "The
 Legal and Economic Status of Wo-
 men."

The delegates will be kept quite
 busy during the sessions of the con-
 vention, but to relieve the strain of
 the hard work there will be many
 entertainment features arranged by
 the local committee. On Friday of
 this week there will be no sessions
 and the delegates will take part in
 the celebration of Santa Clara Day,
 with its flower parades and other
 gorgeous spectacles.

On July 4, the delegates will be
 the guests of the Commercial Club
 at a ride in the bay during the morn-
 ing and in the afternoon they will
 be entertained by the California de-
 legates at Fairmount Park. At the
 meeting in the evening Frances
 Squire Potter will read the declara-
 tion of peace, and Baroness Von
 Suttner will speak on peace, by the
 courtesy of the Peace Society of
 America.

On the afternoon of July 2, a musi-
 cal at the Greek Theatre in Ber-
 keley, under the direction of Mrs.
 Lawrence Maxwell will be the feature
 of entertainment for the delegates.
 In addition to these features there
 will be a number of automobile and
 steamer trips to various points of
 interest in the vicinity of San Fran-
 cisco.

HAMILTON FISH TAKES A BRIDE

New York, June 25—The marriage
 of Mrs. F. Delaplaine Amsinck and
 Hamilton Fish, which took place to-
 day at the bride's home in Fifth
 Avenue, brought together representa-
 tives of two of New York's oldest
 and most prominent families. Mr.
 Fish is the youngest son of the Hamil-
 ton Fish, who was Secretary of State
 in 1869 and later Governor of New
 York. The bride was the widow of
 the late Gustave Amsinck. One of
 her nieces is the wife of J. Bruce Is-
 may, managing director of the White
 Star Line. Today's marriage is the
 second for Mr. Fish and the third
 matrimonial venture for his bride.

LIBRARIANS MEET AT OTTAWA

Ottawa, June 26—The American
 Library Association informally began
 its 34th annual convention here to-
 day the meeting being the first the
 association has held in Canada since
 1900. The association has nearly 2,000
 members, including librarians of pub-
 lic, college, university, medical, law,
 state and other libraries in general.
 About 1,500 members are here to par-
 ticipate in the meeting.

Today was devoted principally to
 the reception of the visitors. The in-
 itial business session will be held to-
 morrow morning, when Mrs. H. L.
 Elmendorf of Buffalo the first wom-
 an to be honored with the presidency
 of the association, will deliver her
 annual address. At the subsequent
 sessions all phases of library work
 will be discussed. The papers, address-
 es and discussions will center prin-
 cipally around the subject of the op-
 portunity afforded by the public lib-
 rary as an open door for informa-
 tion and culture.

The programme will partake of the
 international nature of the meeting,
 one session being given over wholly
 to the presentation of Canadian top-
 ics by Canadian speakers. Among
 these speakers will be George E. Fos-
 ter, Canadian minister of trade and
 commerce; Professor Andrew McPhail
 of McGill University, James W. Rob-
 ertson, C.M.G., of the commissioner
 of conservation and Dr. George H.
 Locke, librarian of the Toronto pub-
 lic library.

Prominent among the participants
 from the United States are Dr. Her-
 bert Putnam, Librarian of Congress;
 Dr. George E. Vincent, president of
 the University of Minnesota, Carl H.
 Milan, secretary of the Indiana Lib-
 rary Commission; Carl B. Roden, of
 the Chicago public library; Walter L.
 Brown of the Buffalo public library,
 and Miss Tessa L. Kelso of New
 York.
