Both Political Parties are  
Ready in Saskatchewan

Polling will take Place on July 11 in Fifty-one Constituencies--  
Both Parties will have a Complete List of Candidates--  
Scott Govt. has Great Record

Regina, Sask., June 26—The official announcement of the dissolution of the second Saskatchewan Legislature found both political parties lined up and prepared for what promises to be one of the most interesting and hard-fought Provincial contests ever engaged in in Canada.

With elections deferred in Cumberland and Athabasca, polling will take place on July 11 in fifty-two constituencies, an increase of thirteen seats over the last House, due to the redistribution bill of last session. Both parties will have candidates in every constituency, the Opposition having received instructions from outside that every seat must be contested. Had this not been the case there is little doubt but that several seats, notably Estevan and Milestone, would have gone by acclamation to the Government.

## FEDERAL ASPECTS TO CAMPAIGN

Though nominally Provincial, the present contest is in reality of far wider import than the average Provincial election, and, while the Scott Government is appealing to the electorate primarily upon its record of seven years' exemplary administration, the Federal aspect of the fight promises to equal in importance, if not indeed to overshadow, the Provincial. That this is so is largely due to the announcement made last September by the Opposition leader, Mr. F. W. G. Haultain, following the Federal elections, that the great aim of the Saskatchewan Conservative party must be to capture the Province in order to "materially assist" Mr. Borden at the next Dominion elections. That injection of Federal politics, coupled with the late disastrous season, during which, owing to lack of proper markets and outlets, the farmers of Saskatchewan have lost millions of dollars, has resulted in reciprocity becoming one of the chief issues, if not the dominant issue of the campaign.

## WIDER MARKETS DEMANDED

A feeling of bitterness prevalent throughout the west against the east arising from the closing of the American market to western grain growers is likely also to be a decided factor, aided by the Dominion Government's imposition of a 25 per cent. duty on rough lumber and their record last session in the matter of terminal elevators and the grain act, which western farmers consider to be absolutely at variance with Premier Borden's pre-election pledges.

## GOVERNMENT'S CLEAR RECORD

A careful review of the situation would seem to leave very little doubt of the return of the Administration of Premier Scott. The seven years' record of the Scott Government is practically without blemish, and the manner in which such big problems as telephones, line elevators, railway extension and education have been handled will undoubtedly stand the government in good stead when polling day comes.

The program of future legislation outlined by Premier Scott in his manifesto to the people of Saskatchewan marks him out as one of Canada's most progressive statesmen including as it does the Government's pledge to take up the question of cheap loans for farmers, to adopt the principle of the initiative and referendum, to develop the great north country, and, if feasible, to inaugurate a great cheap power scheme for southern Saskatchewan.

## ROGERS LEADING OPPOSITION

The Opposition would appear to be depending entirely upon their Ottawa friends, and while the party is nominally led by Mr. Haultain, actual control would appear to be in the hands of Hon. Robert Rogers. Policy takes a secondary place; criticism of the Scott Government's record hardly exists; the whole hope of the Provincial Conservatives rests on the reputation of Mr. Rogers as a successful electioneer, and his openly expressed boast that he would deliver Saskatchewan to Mr. Borden.

Already certain portions of the Province, especially along the Manitoba boundary, have been invaded by Mr. Rogers' election experts, many of whom accompanied him when he visited Regina on June 10. In addition to his workers from Winnipeg and Brandon, Mr. Rogers is also using the Department of the Interior to an extent it was never used before as a political machine, and homestead inspectors are everywhere prominent workers in the Conservative interests. Districts in which under the Laurier Administration two homestead inspectors were able to efficiently do the work now have four inspectors, and, even so, the arrears of inspections now run into the thousands, for the inspectors are wholly occupied with electioneering, as it

was intended they should be when they were appointed in the stead of Liberal appointees who have felt the keen edge of Mr. Rogers' axe.

With little in the way of a definite policy, with no ground of attack upon the Scott Government for their administration of public affairs, the Opposition are wholly dependent upon their Federal allies, a dependence now openly admitted in their party organs.

## DEFECTIONS MULTIPLYING

Every day shows defections of former leading supporters of Mr. Haultain, with practically no similar leakage from the government side to the Opposition. How serious these defections are may be judged from the following list:—

SUFFRAGETTES  
CONTINUE HUNGER STRIKE

London, June 25—Including Mrs. Pankhurst and Mrs. Lawrence ten women have been moved from prison since Saturday on account of forcible feeding. The other suffragettes in prison are continuing the hunger strike and the majority of them are being artificially fed. Many are in the hospital A petition to the Queen is being extensively signed seeking to secure the liberation of the women. The Government has already promised to liberate any who will undertake to refrain from militant tactics in the future.

## QUEEN ALEXANDRA DAY

London, June 26—The love and esteem in which Queen Alexandra is held by all British subjects was strikingly manifested today, on the occasion of the first celebration of Alexandra Day. The day is designed to be an annual fixture in commemoration of the anniversary of the arrival in England of the then Danish princess to become the bride of the future King Edward VII.

In accordance with the suggestion of Queen Alexandra herself the celebration was converted into a one day campaign for charity, the purpose being to bring the needs of the philanthropic and charitable organizations of London before the people. With this end in view more than 1,000 ladies of title and distinction in the social world presided at flower stalls scattered over the metropolis and from early morning until late afternoon sold artificial wild roses for the benefit of the London Hospital Fund. All of the flower sellers were dressed alike in white with wreaths of wild roses around their hats. The flower baskets that they carried were hung with ribbons of white and blue the Danish colors, in honor of Queen Alexandra's native land.

Baskets of coin and notes were collected by Lady Mond and a bevy of pretty girls who had a stall on the terrace of the House of Commons and who permitted no member to escape without paying tribute. Other ladies of title who were stationed at prominent points in the city included the Duchess of Marlborough, the Marchioness of Crews, the Duchess of Westminster, the Marchioness of Dufferin and Lady Paget.

## A NEW COMPANY

Messrs. Nathaniel M. Jones of Bangor, Thomas McAvity, H. W. Schofield, A. H. Hanington of St. John and E. B. Staples of Marysville are seeking incorporation as "The Marysville General Stores Limited." The capital stock is to be fifty thousand dollars. The object is to purchase and carry on the mercantile business now carried on at Marysville by the Edward Partridge Pulp and Paper Company.

## LIKES NEW BRUNSWICK.

Dr. L. P. Jacks of Oxford, England, accompanied by his wife, has completed a tour of Canada and is planning to settle in this country. Dr. Jacks has made a careful investigation of the possibilities in the different parts of the Dominion and as a result of his explorations has decided that New Brunswick offers better openings, besides much more attractive living conditions than any other part of the Dominion. He will probably take up land and engage in one or more of the different branches of agriculture.

CAPT. LORD  
HAULED OVER  
THE COALS

London, June 25—A bitter attack upon Capt. Lord of the Loyland liner Californian, for not going to the aid of the Titanic when her distress signals were flashed, as she was going down, was made at the summing up in the board of trade inquiry today, by Clem Edwards counsel for the federation of Maritime workers. Edwards declared that there was no doubt but the lights seen by survivors in lifeboats were those of the Californian, and he held Capt. Lord's explanation that he thought the distress rockets were private signals to be the "merest excuse."

LABOR LEADERS TO  
SERVE JAIL TERMS

Washington, June 24—Samuel Gompers, Frank Morrison and John Mitchell, the labor leaders were today held guilty of contempt of court by the Supreme Court of the District of Columbia in connection with a court injunction in the Buck Stove and Range Company boycott. They will attempt to appeal again to the Supreme Court of the United States, which reversed their former conviction.

Justice Wright sentenced Gompers to one year the same as upon his previous conviction, but sentenced Morrison to six months and John Mitchell to six months.

Justice Daniels Thom Wright announced the decision of the court. It covered seventy-two closely typewritten pages, and took about two hours to read.

Bondsmen were on hand and attorneys for the labor men gave notice of an intention to file an appeal to have the Supreme Court review the judgment in its previous case. The Supreme Court reversed the conviction on the ground that the contempt proceedings had been improperly instituted. New proceedings were at once begun. The sentences under the first conviction were: Gompers, one year, Morrison, nine months, Mitchell six months.

The charge was that the three men as officers of the American Federation of Labor through the organization's publication, had disregarded Justice Gould's injunction against the publication of the Buck Stove and Range Company's name in its boycott list.

## FOR GOVERNOR OF VERMONT

Burlington, June 26—The Republican leaders of Vermont are gathering in this city to attend the State convention which will meet tomorrow to name candidates for governor and other State officers to be voted for in the September election. There are two aspirants in the field to succeed Governor John A. Mearns. They are Allen M. Fletcher of Cavendish, a millionaire banker and philanthropist and Joseph A. DeBoer of Montpelier. The congressional nominating convention will precede the State convention, that of the first district meeting in this city and the Second district convention at White River Junction. Frank L. Greens, editor of the St. Albans Messenger, is the leading candidate for the seat of the late Representative David J. Foster of the First district. Representative Frank Plumly of the Second district is slated for renomination.
