CHANCELLOR LLOYD GEORGE SPEAKS ON THE FINANCES

London, June 24—In the House of Commons this afternoon Right Hon. David Lloyd-George, chancellor of the exchequer, speaking upon the budget resolutions, reminded the House that there were two contingencies regarding the disposal of the surplus of £6,500,000.

He said that when he made his budget statement the first contingency was whether the coal strike could cause a loss of revenue in consequence of the decreased consumption. He was now able to say that such was the buoyancy of trade that the estimates of revenue given at the beginning of the fiscal year would be well within the mark, and that probably there would be a margin which consequently would render it unnecessary to draw upon revenue at all to meet the ravages of the strike.

The other contingency was a possible increase in the demands of the admiralty upon the exchequer. Right Hon. Winston Churchill, first lord of the admiralty, had stated quite clearly, said Lloyd-George, that he based his estimate upon the assumption that the German navy law would remain unaltered. There was a bill before the Reichstag at that time providing for a very considerable addition to the provision made by the old German navy law. Since then the bill has become an act of the German parliament and it was now no longer a contingency but a fact with which Great Britain was confronted. This new law provides additions to spread over a period of six years of national program, amounting in the aggregate to ten millions pounds sterling, (\$50,000,000).

INCREASED NAVAL EXPENDITURE.

Lloyd-George proceeded to say that in due course Mr. Churchill, as first lord of the admiralty, would submit supplementary naval estimates. It was not for him to anticipate Mr. Churchill's statement in this regard and he only referred to it in so far as was necessary to explain the financial statement which he was now making to the House.

This year, the additional sum that Mr. Churchill would ask for, he continued, did not exceed £1,000,000, but further heavy payments would fall due in subsequent years as the result of the British naval program Mr. Churchill had found it necessary to outline.

TO DEVELOP UGANDA'S RESOURCES.

That left a balance of £5,500,000 sterling which was not disposed of. There was, however, a new item of expenditure which he (Lloyd-George) proposed to recommend to the House. It had reference to the expansion and development of the resources of East Africa and Uganda.

The colonial office was pressing the exchequer for an advance for the further development of that exceed-

ingly rich country. He had recommended a year or two ago that a portion of the surplus should be expended in the extension of the railways of the Uganda and of the protectorate and for the construction of a deep water port and jetty.

There was no doubt at all, he said, about the enormous possibilities of that great country. (Cheers.) There was an increase from year to year of products, which come from that quarter, especially cotton and wheat. It was undoubtedly to the interest of Great Britain to assist every new cotton producing country. This was a lesson which Britain had had in the shortage from the United States of America last year of the injurious effect of our cotton industry. It showed that it was a dangerous thing to rely exclusively upon one particular source of supply for one of our most important industries.

PRODUCTS ROTTING ON WHARVES.

Having given figures of the exports of Uganda cotton in recent years, Lloyd-George proceeded to say that this year it was expected that there would be 105,000 hundredweight exported from Uganda alone. Last year, for the first time, there were exports from the protectorate. The railroads, steamboats and piers were quite inadequate to the development of that new source of supply. According to reports to the colonial office the products were rotting on the wharves and platforms for lack of carrying capacity and storing room. What was wanted was a large number of engines, carriages and stores, also development of the roads, especially in the district of Lake Kioga, which was one of the most promising districts of the whole empire for cotton growing.

In this connection the chancellor said that he was told that owing to the lack of road accommodation the natives could not bring produce to the lake. The natives were very much discouraged at this situation, because having produced the cotton under the stimulus of great promises they found it very disappointing that they could not get their cotton away.

It was proposed the government should advance to the colonial office a sum of £500,000 at a fairly remunerative rate of interest. This rate was not yet settled but Lloyd-George thought that the rate to be charged should be that of the last loan, namely three and a half per cent., with one per cent. for sinking fund.

The remaining £5,000,000 of the surplus would, he said, be devoted to the redemption of debt. The local reduction of debt affected by the present government, including the £5,000,000, would be \$78,184,000, and he asked as a matter of fair play that when comments were made upon the price of consols, adverse to the government, the figures of the debt reduction should be given as well.

TO HEAD UNIVERSITY OF ARLANSAS

Little Rock, Ark., June 26—The trustees of the University of Arkansas at Fayetteville met here today to discuss the selection of a president of the university to succeed Professor J. N. Tillman, who has resigned. The first choice of the trustees is said to be Dr. S. C. Mitchell, who is now the president of the University of South Carolina. It is known whether Dr. Mitchell will accept the offer of the presidency of the Fayetteville institution.
