PROPOSITION INDEFINITE.

At this meeting a letter was read from a recent joint meeting of the Board of Health and City Council, asking the hospital trustees to furnish a site upon which to erect an Isolation Hospital. The Trustees seemed to think the application was indefinite in regard to the kind of building intended as well as in other three weeks before the plans will so reply to the application. Some question also arose as to the powers of the Trustees in the premises.

The Hospital has still many patients especially in the private rooms. There are still five scarlet fever patients in the Dowling, but some of these are only awaiting the peeling process and they will retire. In the absence of President McMurray from the city yesterday the chair was occupied by vice president Clark. The other gentlemen in attendance included His Worship the Mayor, Coun. Pickard, Mr. VanDine, Mr. Shipp, Mr. Gregory, and the Secretary Treasurer. The Committee of the Medical Staff that interviewed Architect Brodie was composed of Dr. VanWart and Dr. Weaver.

Buckingham Palace resembled more a mobilization centre than a peaceful home of royalty. Two ambulance corps were on the scene, and both male and female nurses found plenty to do with cases of fainting among the spectators.

## KING SAW THE BATTLE

With the exception of a few minutes when King George stood at the window watching the preparations to defend him from the attentions of the women the palace presented a deserted appearance.

A police inspector said that when Mrs. Pankhurst was arrested he carried her inside the gate park and she shouted: "That is right. Arrest me at the gates of the palace. Tell the King."

The total arrests numbered fifty-seven including three men. A dozen suffragettes, who were lodged in the small police station at Wellington Arch, smashed every window in the place and behaved so violently that they had to be removed to bigger stations where there were more police to guard them.

Mrs. Pankhurst was taken to Holloway jail for breaking the terms of the license under which she was last released.

The police raided a West End flat tonight and arrested four militants.

## TO HONOR WOMEN OF THE CONFEDERACY

Raleigh, N.C., May 22—President Wilson has promised to come to Raleigh next month to attend the unveiling of the memorial in honor of the Confederate women of North Carolina. The unveiling will be a feature of the annual reunion of the CONFEDERATE VETERANS OF THIS STATE.

The visit of President Wilson will be the first occasion since the civil war that a president of the United States has come below Mason and Dixon's Line to participate in a celebration of Confederate sentiments. It also will be the first time a president of the United States has unveiled, except on the battlefield at Gettysburg, a monument to those sentiments.

The monument that is to be unveiled stands on the Capitol grounds in this city. It is a gift from the late Col. Ashley Horne, of Clayton, N.C. in memory of his mother, who sent six sons to Lee's army, three of whom were killed.

Col. Horne announced his gift of \$10,000 for the erection of a memorial in honor of the women of the Confederacy only a short time before his death, which occurred last October. He was a Confederate veteran and one of the leading men of North Carolina. He was only twenty years old when he enlisted in the 1st North Carolina Infantry and he served from the beginning to the end of the war. Nearly all of his service was with Lee in the army of Northern Virginia and he was with him at the surrender.

Turning his face homeward after the war, young Horne found a portion of Sherman's army still occupying his father's devastated plantation. The blight of war on the Horne place had reduced plenty to poverty. Of his five brothers three had been killed in battle and the other two were in federal prisons. With a negro boy he came in the night to the Union camp in Raleigh, where Sherman had accumulated a great quantity of stock and succeeded in getting away with two horses without being detected by the guards. Having nothing with which to feed them after he got them home he grazed one while he plowed with the other and thus he made for his parents a small crop of corn and melons.

After a long struggle Col. Horne got together a capital of \$600. With this he entered business and eventually became one of the wealthiest farmers, manufacturers and merchants in North Carolina. In 1908 he was a Democratic candidate for governor, but was defeated.

The memorial which has been given to the state through Col. Horne's munificence was designed by Augustus Lukeman, the New York sculptor. The memorial group depicts a "grand mother of the Confederacy," who sits reading to a boy the story of the state's belief in its idea and its gallantry for the cause, while the boy listens, clasping a sheathed sword. The faces were selected by the sculptor as types. The gown of the grand mother was modelled from a veritable ante-bellum example.
