HARD DRIVING ON UPPER WATERS OF ST. JOHN RIVER

Kilburn and Chouinard Forced to Abandon Drives--Morrison's May Get Out--W. J. Noble and Currier in Safe Waters

Members of John Kilburn's crew which was driving on the headwaters of the St. John River have arrived in this city bringing the report that the drive has been hung up on Crapaud Lake twelve miles short of English Lake where it was reported first that the drive was abandoned. The drive consists of about 5,000,000 feet for Murray & Gregory and will remain there until next spring.

Mr. Kilburn himself is at St. Fabien, Montmagny County, seriously ill. He was at the main camp for two weeks this spring when forced by illness to leave. Dr. W. H. Irvine and Wardlow Kilburn son of Mr. Kilburn will leave tonight for St. Fabien to bring him home.

OTHER OPERATORS

Kilburn's men say that Flavien Chouinard's drive of 20,000,000 feet for Stetson, Cutler & Co., is hung up on Depot Stream and Black River the lumber being there until next year. W. J. Noble of New Maryland who is driving for the same firm is reported in safe waters as is also A. J. Currier. J. A. Morrison who has a drive of 9,000,000 feet on Baker Branch may come out all right. There is little water on any of the streams however and the driving is hard.

CONCRETE BLOCKS MAY BE USED FOR HOSPITAL EXTENSION

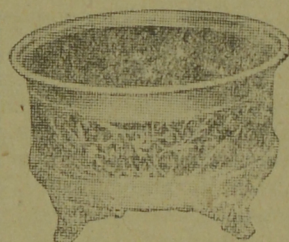
Trustees Will Call for Tenders at Once --Proposition Re Isolation Hospital Considered Too Indefinite-- Many Patients

The Trustees of the Hospital were in session for some time yesterday discussing proposed improvements with Architect Brodie. Previously a committee of Medical staff also met Mr. Brodie and at the suggestion of this committee several changes were made which will not add to the cost of the proposed structure. Subsequently these suggested changes were accepted by the Trustees. Directions have not been given to Mr. Brodie to prepare working plans in accordance with the changes made.

TO CALL FOR TENDERS

It has been decided to invite tenders for a structure of brick and also of concrete blocks. Several of the Trustees seemed to strongly favor blocks and it is claimed it would look better and be less expensive. The location of the building will be at right angles to the lower side of the present building extending toward the river. It will be two or three weeks before the plans will be ready and after they are received and approved it is intended to proceed at once with arrangements for making provision for enlargement of accommodation that has been badly needed for a long time. No definite arrangement has been made for the necessary funds, but the public can be depended upon when the situation is made clear.

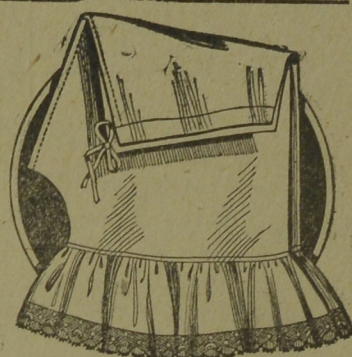

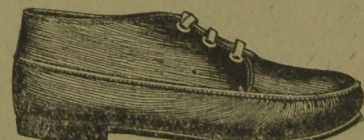
