## MOVEMENT TO COLLECT FOR THE PATRIOTIC FUND

Meeting to be Held on Monday Evening to Formulate Plans--The Daughters of the Empire Are Active

Whether the citizens of Fredericton will contribute to a local patriotic fund or to the National Patriotic Fund will be decided at the committee meeting of the City Council to be held in the Council Chamber on Monday evening.

Mayor Mitchell has invited all citizens to be present and express their ideas to the Council. No provision has yet been made for the families of volunteers who have left for active service and there is considerable speculation as to which fund would be the most valuable.

The Howard Douglas Chapter and the Provincial Chapter of the Daughters of the Empire will hold a meeting in their rooms on Queen street on Monday evening to make arrangements regarding the patriotic funds. It is altogether likely that a systematic campaign will be conducted and a house to house canvas made by committees appointed in different sections of the city.

## MORE VOLUNTEERS EMBARK FOR VALCARTIER

Second Detachment Were Given a Hearty Send off by the Citizens ---Remembered by the City and County Councils

Unfavorable weather conditions did not tend to dampen the loyal and patriotic ardour of the large number of citizens who turned out last evening to give a hearty send-off to the second detachment of volunteers for overseas service from the 71st Regiment on the eve of their departure for Valcartier, Quebec.

Thirty volunteers under the command of Acting Color Sergt. Arthur Chalu, formed the second contingent that Fredericton has sent forth to do battle for the Empire within the short period of two weeks. Many pathetic scenes took place at the station as the boys bid farewell to mothers, sisters, brothers and other relatives, and a particularly sad incident occurred just before the train pulled out from the station when a woman named Stapley, whose husband was among the volunteers made frantic efforts to accompany him. The woman with her twelve year old daughter ran out on the railway bridge and friends had considerable difficulty in endeavoring to prevent her from boarding the rear car on the train.

## PRESENTATIONS AT ARMOURY

At four o'clock the men assembled in the drill hall and after a short address by Mayor Mitchell, they were presented with five dollars in cash on behalf of the City Council and the Municipality of York, Major W.

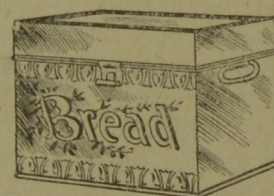
