## MAYOR MITCHELL ORDERED

of the Police force, and also City Solicitor R. B. Hanson. One of the women also was heard. She stated that she was intoxicated at the time and did not remember what occurred. The statements of the others all were contrary to that of the magistrate who grew very indignant.

USED STRONG LANGUAGE.

His Honor used strong language at various stages of the proceedings. He characterized the statements of several witnesses as absolutely false and claimed that that of the woman corroborated his own version of the affair.

Chairman McKay and Mayor Mitchell were two members of the Police Commission who had been present when the women were before the court. Police Magistrate Marsh called both liars and applied the same term to Mr. Hanson. With regard to the Chief of Police he said he would not take his word under any circumstances. The language of the magistrate was violent at various times and he absolutely refused to be convinced by the statements of others made against his version of the affair.

CLASH WITH THE MAYOR.

His clash with the mayor was the final stage of the proceedings. Mayor Mitchell questioned him concerning the fact that the two women had been placed in the cells at noon and remained there till late in the afternoon of April 16. His Honor stated he had dismissed the women and that it was two other women who had been placed in the cells. His Worship pointed out that the word of several witnesses including himself the mayor of the city, was to the contrary.

The magistrate then lost his temper again.

"You think that because you're mayor you can do what you like with me. I don't care if you are mayor. If you say that you are a liar."

"I am not out to stand being called a liar by you. I have witnesses of what you said."

The police magistrate repeated the statement and Mayor Mitchell leaped to his feet and opened the door of the office.

"You get out of this office," he said. "This is my office and you don't call me a liar and stay in it."

"I'll get out," said the magistrate and as the door shut in his face again called His Worship a liar.

While the examination was in progress Col. Marsh repeatedly stated that he could prove that he was right by P. A. Guthrie, who had acted for the defendants in the case in question.

"Produce Mr. Guthrie now," replied City Solicitor Hanson.

"I won't," was the reply. "I'll produce him when I get ready."

MR. HANSON MAKES CHARGE.

"I'll tell you this right here," replied Mr. Hanson. "You're a scoundrel. What these men have said was correct. More than that you made a corrupt agreement with P. A. Guthrie before you went into court to try that case at all. You agreed with him to impose fines of five dollars each. I can prove that and the attorney general of this province was informed of that at the time. You've been saddled on this town long enough and there will be steps taken to investigate this whole thing."

## C. N. R. AGREEMENT

bond guarantee, running rights between the C.N.R. and I.C.R. had been provided for. As to the provision in the present agreement that all traffic must be carried by the C.N.R. to Canadian points, he pointed out that where traffic shall go depends entirely on the choice of the shipper and not the railroad.

Mr. Graham believed that something was due to MacKenzie and Mann but why could they not, as the C.P.R. promoters had done, put their own money into the system. He thought that they should be asked to make affidavits as to the amount of their personal property above indebtedness and that this should be risked on their part. And until the railway was completed, control of it should be handed over to the government.

MR. CARRICK.

"I propose to extend my personal sympathy to the member for Calgary," (Mr. Bennett), said Mr. Carrick. "Disappointment in politics is like disappointment in love. It is liable to change the love's disposition. The house of commons at the present time has no representative from Alberta in the cabinet and this is a bitter disappointment to the hon. member. The hon. would-be member of the cabinet has shown a bitter jealousy of the solicitor general in his speech. It is well known that he has been an aspirant of the position of 'solicitor general himself.'"

The member for Calgary had the temerity to state that when he had made his speech the government would not dare to give aid to the C.N.R. It is the irony of fate that we are sent down here to follow Mr. Borden rather than a bucking broncho from the west, "who would kick the government bars, the back benchers with would-be cabinet aspirations, the greatest railway authority in captivity."

It was understood, said Mr. Carrick, that a new party known as the Bull Moose party had been formed. Mr. Bennett was its leader and Mr. McKie its first lieutenant. The member for Prince Edward county was to have been chief whip but had declined and had decided to remain a barnacle on the ship of state. The member for Brandon (Mr. Atkins) was the Don Quixote of the outfit but had decided that discretion was the better part of valor and had gone away to attend bar association meetings. He believed that he who fights and runs away will live to fight another day.

E. M. MacDONALD.

"Canada has witnessed the striving spectacle of two of her ablest young men, hitherto supporting the policies of this government, strike down this wretched thing," said E. M. MacDonald. "The members for Calgary and Kingston, men in the enthusiasm of youth, men with careers before them, men of great ability, absolute integrity, altogether disinterested, altogether patriotic, have torn asunder the ties of association and sentiment which bound them to their party. Young men of ambition don't do this sort of things lightly. The indictment which those two men have presented to this house is so serious, so grave and important, that the country is awakening to the situation. If the government is wise it will head and pause and consider before it has anything more to do with the unclean thing."

Mr. MacDonald reverted to the dying days of last session when the MacKenzie and Mann grab of a \$15,000,000 subsidy was put through. At that time he had demanded to know from both the premier and the minister of finance whether it was to be the end. Parliament was then told and the country was then told by Premier Borden and Hon. W. T. White that, upon the solemn assurance of MacKenzie and Mann they were enabled to state that no further aid would be required.

"We know now," declared Mr. MacDonald, who refused to mince his words, "that those statements and assurances were absolutely and unqualifiedly untrue."

Resuming after the eight o'clock recess, Mr. MacDonald strongly criticized that portion of the agreement which gives the Canadian Northern running rights over the Intercolonial, and asserted that it gave to the C.N.R. privileges for which they had sought and had been refused by the parliament of Canada on a previous occasion. They were given privileges which the Canadian Pacific had offered to pay for and had been refused. In days gone by the prime minister had been wont to talk of "government-owned railways and railway owned governments." Where did he stand today?—at the head of a combination that was body and soul in the hands of the railways.

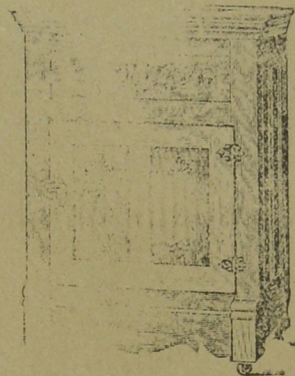
In conclusion, he urged the government not to set its foot upon "this great gamble," fraught with danger and disaster and moved, seconded by Hon. Charles Murphy, that the resolution be given the six months' hoist.

The debate was adjourned by A. K. MacLean of Halifax, for W. M. German of Welland, to be resumed on Monday.
