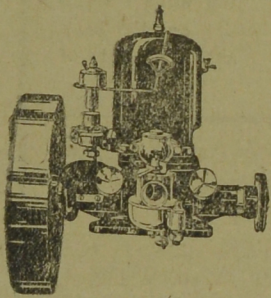

## "GUNBOAT" SMITH MAY BE UNDER SUSPENSION

Milwaukee, May 15—Because Gunboat Smith asked for an \$8,000 guarantee to fight Bob Moha in Milwaukee, the promoters called off the match entirely and now Smith will get nothing here and another match will be arranged to take the place of the Smith-Moha affair. Inasmuch as Smith had signed preliminary articles for the fight and then raised his figure, the promoters will make the State Boxing Commission suspend him or take steps to prevent his coming to Milwaukee to box for any other club. This request will not be made, however, unless Smith dickers with some other promoter.

## AMERICAN GOLFERS OUT- CLASSED BY BRITISH

Travers Beaten by Graham of Scotland—Oulmet United States Champion Finished in Thirteenth Place—Fear of Americans Greatly Diminished

Sandwich, Eng., May 15—American golfers today were outclassed by Scotch and English players over the Sandwich links in the final round for the St. George's Champion Grand Challenge Cup.

With an aggregate of 146 nine better than his nearest American competitor, Jesome D. Travers, American amateur champion John Graham, jr., Scotland today won for the second time the coveted trophy. Graham also lowered by two strokes the play for the cup.

Travers for the thirty six holes turned in a card of 155. Francis Oulmet the American open champion required 158 strokes to cover the course.

In the general competition Oulmet finished in thirteenth place.

D. Ranson Crowborough, Eng., who led the first round Thursday with 72 today required ten more strokes, which brought his aggregate score up to 154. Harold Hilton the British amateur champion finished with 158.

The showing of the Americans in the match has greatly diminished fears of Britishers that the amateur championship will again cross the Atlantic.

## PIRATES FURNISH THE SURPRISE PACKAGE

New York, May 16—The wonderful early season work of the Pittsburgh Pirates is the talk of the big top. While the firsts were dropped out as pennant contenders before the opening of the season, few if any followers of the game were prepared to witness such brilliant pastime as has been staged by the Clarke out fit to date.

Since the first crack of the bat and ball the whole Piratical crew has been going like a prairie fire. Pitchers who were more or less wobbly last season are now flinging like world's champions. And the infield, with Wagner, Konetchy, Viox and Mowrey holding forth, it's a la-la-lam. And just to show how nicely everything breaks for the "Foot Sniffers," the veteran George Gibson who came to life and is busting pitcher's hearts with safe wall loons. Barring accidents, about the only thing that can stop the Corsairs is a Mexican gunboat in the Allegheny River. As a Mex would have considerable difficulty in reaching Smoketown the Pirates felt safe.

## MARITIME LEAGUE HAS BLOWN UP WITH LOUD NOISE

Pictou County Organization Would Not Agree to Final Terms--No Organized Ball

The Maritime League that was to be has blown up. St. John, Halifax, and Moncton representatives have good reason to feel sore and the whole matter of the league is going through is the result of the Pictou county representatives not standing by the agreement which some days ago they accepted. The agreement in question was handled by Mr. Cunningham of Stellarton N.S. who took it to N. W. Mason of New Glasgow to have signed, and when everything was thought to be settled, and Moncton, St. John and Halifax expended an amount of money and arranged for their teams, the Pictou representative comes across with the word "We must have a wet weather guarantee in addition to the other concessions given us or we don't sign up." When this was placed before the representatives of the other three teams they at once said it was not fair and that it looked like a hold-up on the part of Pictou Co. and the request was turned down.

Mr. McQuarrie of Westville N. S., who was in St. John Thursday at a meeting stated that if the matter could be arranged, when he went back home he would wire yesterday afternoon. There was no word from Mr. McQuarrie and last evening it was decided that it was all off. It is a big blow to organized baseball for St. John and the best chance for seasons to Halifax, Moncton and Pictou County has been lost, not saying about the great disappointment that the fans will receive.

One regrettable thing is that St. John, Moncton and Halifax promoters are the heavy losers financially, while to date as far as can be learned it has not cost the Pictou County representatives very much since they were first approached regarding the formation of a league.

Local fans will this season have to put up with amateur baseball and what promised to be the best season since organized baseball was introduced in St. John will be a dead one.

He could join the Pirates tomorrow at a salary that wouldn't be ashamed of itself if it met Cobb's money on the street—and he said: 'No, not unless Herrmann say, O.K.'"

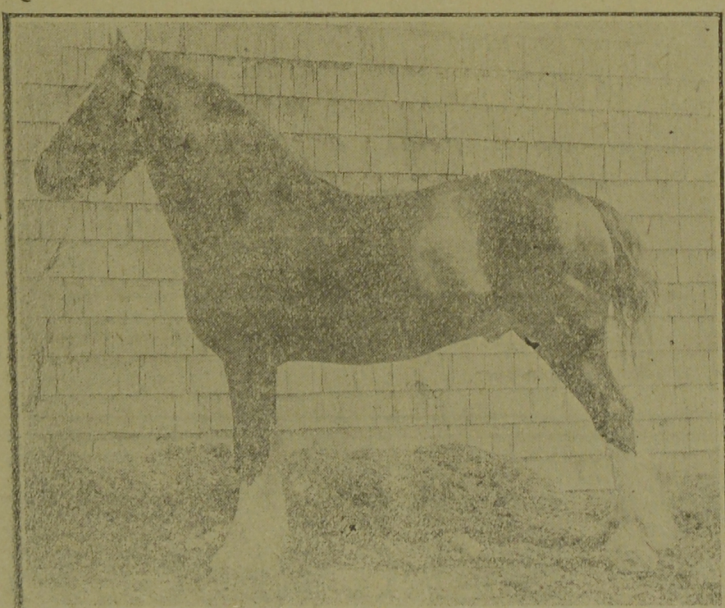

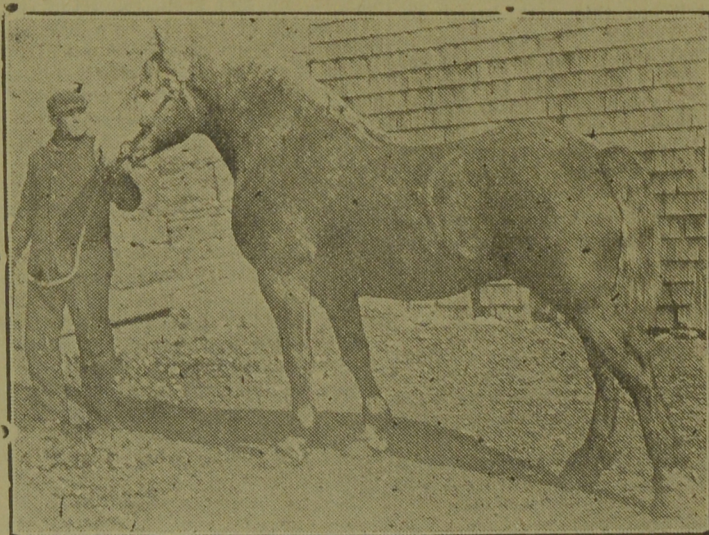

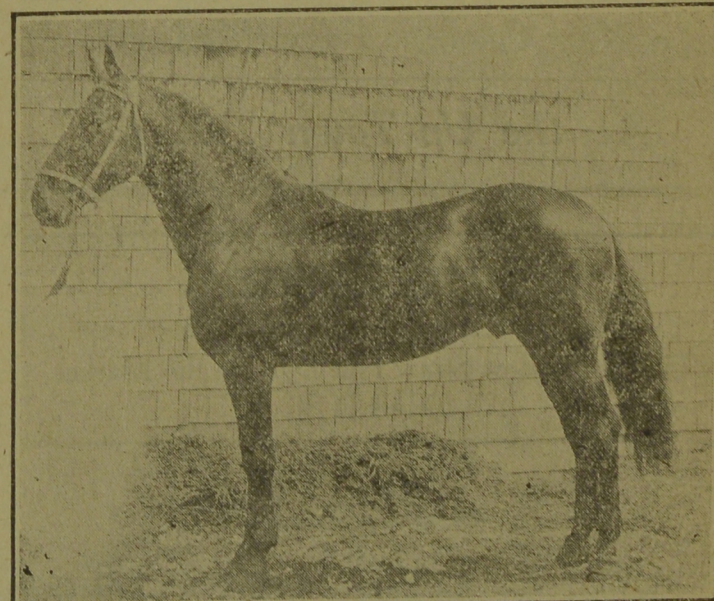
