GREAT IMPROVEMENTS AT MARYSVILLE COTTON MILL

In the last few months great improvements have been made at the Cotton Mill in Marysville. A person visiting this mill a year ago and taking a trip through the different departments now, would hardly think it was the same establishment. Improvements and new machinery have been added to almost every room throughout the great industry. A large up-to-date boiler has been installed, which, of course, is a great advantage and a wonderful addition to the running power of the plant. At present Mr. Bert Manzer has a crew of men at work putting a new, hard-pine ceiling in the engine-room. As the wood is varnished and polished in its natural color, it is very pretty and attractive. It is also the intention of the management to have the engine-room floored. When complete this department will be in line with any of the cotton mills in Canada. Coming from the engine-room into the weave-room, great improvements are noticeable also. In the past few months about two hundred new, up-to-date looms of the very latest design have been added to the already seven hundred and twenty which have been running for some years, therefore the mill has nearly one thousand looms working in the two weave-rooms which together employ in the vicinity of three hundred hands. Great alterations have been made in the carding-room, old-time carding machines having been thrown out and new, English cards installed. Improvements have also been made in the picker-room. While new spinning frames have been added to the spinning-room, new, up-to-date beamers have been added to that department, which makes work go much better with improved results. A great deal of money has been expended on the cloth-hall and finishing-room. A large, new, high-priced calender has been installed in the basement on concrete flooring, which puts a much nicer finish on the goods manufactured. The large finishing-machine in the same department, makes it possible for the Marysville mill to compete with the English and Upper Can-

adian mills in the manufacture of gingham, flannelettes, shirting, fancy dress goods, etc., etc. Wonderful advancement has been made in the dye-house connected with the mill, making that department up-to-date in every particular. The napping-room which is a very important department of all flannelette mills, has been lately enlarged and improved, new German and French nappers having been added to this department of which our genial friend, Thomas Kirky, is the careful and skillful overseer.

The mule spinning-room has not been forgotten when the improvements were handed out as that department is now running along nicely and keeping in line with the rest of the mill. Since the C.P.R. has been running into Marysville by way of the spur on the Minto & Fredericton Railway, the cotton mill has been burning coal, which they claim is a great improvement on wood, which the mill has been using for years up to the present time. The coal is run up an elevated track and dumped from the car into the large concrete bins built for the purpose. In the past the cotton mill used wood from the Dow mills, which are situated on the opposite side of the Nashwaak. The expense of hauling the wood over the river to the cotton mill was very heavy, therefore by using coal that expense is done away with.

Although the improvements on the cotton mill property have been the means of a large expenditure of money, the fruits of the outlay have already shown themselves and it is reported that the Marysville mill has not only excelled itself in the past months but has done better than any of the other cotton mills controlled by the Canadian Colored Cotton Company, which has several mills in different parts of Canada. The output from the Marysville mill last week was a record breaker and business is increasing. The weekly stock reports show what good management can do when they have the goods to back them up.

Mr. Dolphin, who is at present the head of affairs in the cotton mill at Marysville, has proved to be the right man in the right place as he has with the able and skillful co-operation of his overseers, brought a run-down mill up to a high standard, which compares favorably with any mill doing business in Canada. Of late several English families who are experts in the cotton business, have arrived from Montreal and other Upper Canadian cities and are at present employed in different parts of the Marysville mill. The families who are coming into Marysville to reside are an excellent class of people, who are all good workers and will make excellent citizens. With the additional help in the mill the past few months there must be in the vicinity of seven hundred on the pay-roll, which means a large outlay of money which is put into circulation every two weeks and must certainly be a benefit to the business interests of both Marysville and Fredericton. The only drawback now is the cancelling of the ten o'clock train between the two places, which is a great loss to the Fredericton merchants in all lines of business. There is no excuse why this train cannot be put into service again.

HOW THE EXPRESSION "PRINTER'S DEVIL" STARTED

Few know the meaning of expression "Printer's Devil" which is usually applied to the lad in a printing or newspaper office who does the small chores of lesser importance. An explanation of the expression is found in the following:—

In the early days of printing, the art was much of a mystery and ignorant people thought the printer evoked the powers of evil. Aldus Manutius, the famous Italian printer of the sixteenth century went to Africa on an exploring expedition, and brought back with him a very black negro boy. Negroes were a rarity then. The report immediately gained circulation that the printer had been employing the Black Art in his work and the pickaninny was in reality an imp of Satan. He was called the "Little Black Devil." The charge became so serious that the printer was forced to exhibit the negro in public. In his announcement he said:—

"Be it known to Venice that I, Aldus Manutius, printer of the Holy Church and to the Doge, have this day made public exposure of the 'Printer's Devil.' All those who think he is not flesh and blood may come and pinch him."

The term thus had its origin in this way and has been handed down from generation to generation.

GENIAL GEORGE HAM IS NOW A COLONEL

He has been made an honorary lieutenant-colonel of the Canadian militia, in recognition of his services to his country, especially by way of making Canada well known through out the civilized world. The new dignity given him was conferred Saturday, and conveyed to him by Colonel the Honorable Sam Hughes, Dominion Minister of Militia. It came as a surprise to him when he had gone to Ottawa to attend the annual parliamentary press gallery banquet, at which he was one of the principal speakers.

While generally known as an expert railway publicist, in connection with the intelligence department of the Canadian Pacific Railway, Mr. Ham has had a brilliant journalistic career, both as an editor and as a war correspondent during the Northwest Rebellion. In 1891 he retired from newspaper work to become head of the publicity bureau of the C.P.R. In that capacity he has traversed the continent after time, entertaining many parties of tourists, and always spreading his gospel of good cheer and optimism, and incidentally creating the belief that the C.P.R. is the greatest railway in the world.
