## THE VALLEY RAILWAY MATTER

(Continued from page one.)

lost in the Drummond road. In the  
Southampton another \$155,000 would  
be gone. He said if this deal went  
through there would still be more  
money lost. He also went into the  
affairs of the Tobique & Campbellton  
Railway.

HON. MR. HAZEN.

Hon. Mr. Hazen, replying, said that  
in the case of the member for Carle-  
ton, the more violent language he  
used the less grounds there was usual-  
ly for the attack he was making. It  
was hard to see what was his purpose  
in the present instance. He had ac-  
quitted the minister of railways and  
the department of railways of any  
blame and had admitted that the sub-  
sidies had not been overpaid and that  
they were justified. This was rather  
a matter of local concern for New  
Brunswick.

Mr. Hazen referred to the fact that  
during the last session of the New  
Brunswick legislature certain charges  
had been preferred but the man mak-  
ing them exonerated all the members  
of the government except the premier  
and Hon. H. F. McLeod, federal mem-  
ber for York. A royal commission  
had been appointed to investigate  
that question and its report should  
be waited for before passing any op-  
inion. During the last session there  
had also been a committee of five  
members appointed to investigate  
charges made regarding the St. John  
Railway and Mr. Hazen quoted Frank  
Black of Westmorland, one of the  
members of the committee, as declar-  
ing that every dollar of money hand-  
ed out by the province or dominion  
had gone into the construction of the  
road properly.

Mr. Carvell had suggested that Mr.  
Flemming was going to New York,  
ostensibly for his health, but really  
to cover up some transactions in  
connection with this railway. Mr.  
Hazzen assured the House that Mr.  
Flemming was really a sick man and  
that his object in going to New York  
was to consult a specialist.

MR. MICHAUD.

Mr. Michaud, continuing the debate  
tonight, strongly urged the comple-  
tion of the northern part of the road,  
connecting with the N.T.R. He as-  
serted that the C.P.R. was seeking to  
prevent the completion of this sec-  
tion of the road as that company  
did not want the competition of an-  
other transcontinental.

H. F. McLEOD.

H. F. McLeod took up the subject  
in a vigorous reply to F. B. Carvell.  
He described some of Mr. Carvell's  
statements as "vicious and violent,"  
and said that he had "a perverted  
mind" and a "dishonest intellect."

The Speaker was called upon and  
ruled that this language was unpar-  
liamentary. A little later Mr. Mc-  
Leod said that at a New Brunswick  
Liberal convention before the building  
of the N.T.R. a resolution had been  
moved in favor of the Valley route  
and that Mr. Carvell had made that  
resolution "still born."

This Mr. Carvell denied and the  
speaker expected him to accept the  
statement of Mr. Carvell.

Mr. McLeod did so but later refer-  
red to Mr. Carvell as "the chief ex-  
ecutioner."

"That is false," shot back Mr.  
Carvell.

Then the Speaker called both mem-  
bers to order and Mr. McLeod put his  
statement in another form. Either  
Mr. Carvell had been instrumental in  
killing the resolution or he had lost  
his influence.

Mr. Carvell pointed out that the  
first speech he had made in the House  
was in favor of the St. John Valley  
Railway.

Mr. McLeod—Did you vote for it?  
Mr. Carvell—I never voted against  
it.

Mr. McLeod said that the late gov-  
ernment would never do anything, but  
that finally, in 1911, "the Lord deliv-  
ered them into our hands," and the  
new government was more sympathet-  
ic. The standard of the road was  
changed because they did not want to  
build another road like the N.T.R. in  
New Brunswick, costing \$102,000 a  
mile.

Mr. Carvell had declared that at the  
promoters took off \$2,700,000 to New  
York. This, said Mr. McLeod, was  
absolutely incorrect. The proceeds  
of the bonds were deposited with the  
Prudential Trust Company of New-  
real and only paid out upon order-

council of the government of New  
Brunswick.

HON. MR. EMMERSON.

Hon. Mr. Emmerson said sympathy  
for Premier Flemming would have  
been more deserved when the charges  
had been made in the New Brunswick  
legislature, if Mr. Flemming had in-  
sisted upon an immediate investiga-  
tion. Instead he had not asked for  
investigation until after he had  
brought down a bill to further add the  
company under suspicion. The com-  
mission government should withhold  
further aid until the royal commis-  
sion had done its work. Mr. Carvell  
had but done his duty as an honest  
man. For his action he was entitled  
to the thanks of the people of New  
Brunswick and of all Canada and he  
would receive their thanks.

TARIFF RESOLUTIONS.

Hon. W. T. White's tariff resolu-  
tions were then taken up. There was  
considerable discussion in regard to  
an item changing the surtax which  
the government may impose under  
certain conditions from one-third to  
twenty per cent.

W. S. Loggie then announced he  
would move a resolution to place  
potatoes on the free list when com-  
ing from the United States to Cana-  
da. He said that the removal of  
the Canadian duty would mean the  
removal of the United States duty.

Mr. Loggie moved a resolution to  
the effect that potatoes the producer  
of the United States should be ad-  
mitted free of duty to Canada when  
the United States removed its em-  
bargo regulations now existing  
against like articles of Canadian  
growth.

Hon. W. T. White, on account of  
the lateness of the hour, did not  
make any reply to Mr. Loggie's argu-  
ments but said the motion must be  
rejected as being inconsistent with  
the government's fiscal policy. It  
was announced that other Liberal  
members would speak on this ques-  
tion and the committee reported pro-  
gress at 12.45.
