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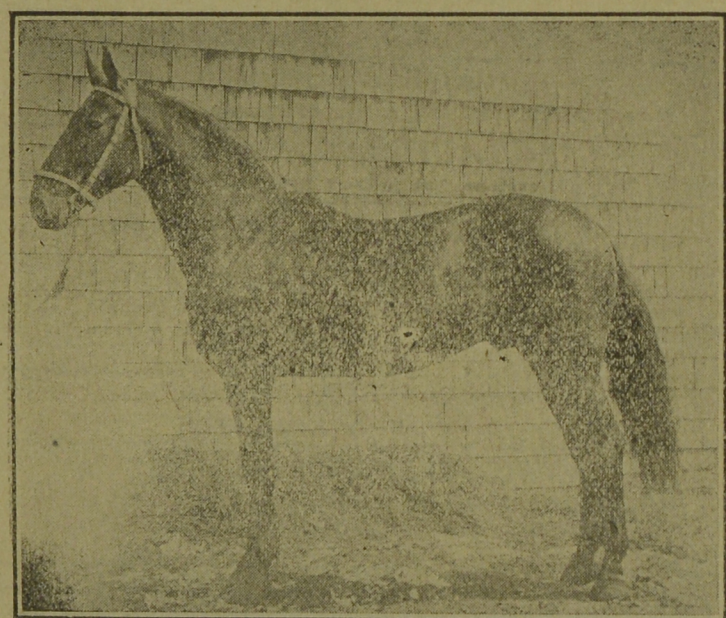

ENGLISH BOY MAKES REMARKABLE THROW WITH BALL

G. T. Carter Threw Cricket-Ball 127 Yards 2 Feet Recently--Few Ball Players Can Equal Throw

G. T. Carter of Wellington School in England made recently what is believed to be a record school boy throw with a cricket ball. Three times he threw better than 120 yards and his best throw was 127 yds 2 ft. The young man is also a promising broad jumper, as he cleared 21 ft 4 in. There may be an American school-boy who can throw a baseball 383 ft, but it is doubtful and there are not very many ball players, of whatever age or league, who can surpass the English lad's performance with a cricket ball.

Sheldon Lejeune, who is credited with a record for throwing the baseball a distance of 427 ft 9 in, was in a class by himself. Few men have been credited, even unofficially, with equalling John Hatfield's record of 400 ft 7 in, made as far back as 1872. The record for throwing the cricket ball is 422 feet, made by R. Percival at Durham Sands Race-course, England, in 1884.

These facts are interesting because the baseball and cricket ball are almost identical in size and weight. The baseball must not weigh less than five or more than 5 1/4 ounces and its circumference must not be less than nine or more than 9 1/4 inches. The cricket's ball weight is 5 1/2 to 5 1/4 ounces and its circumference the same as that of the baseball, nine to 9 1/4 inches.

SEVERAL NEW RECORDS PUT ON AT BROOKLYN GAMES

Kelly and Eller Equalled World's Records for low Hurdles--Drew's Performance in Ninety-Yards Sprint was Remarkable

New York, April 28--One world's record was smashed and two more equalled and one armory mark lowered and another equalled at the Loughlin Lyceum games last night in the 13th Regiment Armory Brooklyn.

Howard P. Drew of Springfield, Mass, bow a student at the University of Southern California established new figures in the ninety yard dash, Fred W. Kelly who carried the colors of the University of California to victory at the Pennsylvania relays on Saturday equalled the 75-yard high hurdle record; Jack Eller the veteran hurdler and sprinter of the Irish American A. C. equalled the record in the 75-yard low hurdles race and Eddie Goodwin, champion bicycle rider of the I. A. A. C. clipped a fifth of a second from the one mile armory record in his heat of the two mile bicycle race. Homer Baker equalled the armory mark in the 600-yard race.
