HERE TODAY, FIRST
STEAMER, G. K. KING

Three Other Tugs Latona, Onawna and Daniel on Way From St. John
---D. J. Purdy and Victoria on Route Next Week

The tug G. K. King arrived here from St. John this morning being the first steamer of the season. The tugs Latona, Daniel and Onawna are on their way from St. John and are expected to arrive today or tomorrow. These tugs are to hang booms for the St. John River Log driving company. Ice along the shores will prevent the hanging of booms for some days, but as soon as conditions permit the booms will be hung.

The G. K. King started from St. John yesterday morning and encountered much floating ice on the way. She is now lying at the St. John Log Driving Company's wharf at St. Mary's. The tug Eldred arrived early this afternoon.

Ex. Ald. Robert Scott, manager for the Fredericton S. S. Company is in St. John today making arrangements for putting the steamer Victoria on the route. President R. F. Randolph of the Fredericton S. S. Company stated this morning that the Victoria would make its first trip to Fredericton no later than Tuesday next, May 5, and may make it on Saturday, May 2. The steamer D. J. Purdy of the Crystal Stream S. S. Company will make her first trip on Monday, May 4. Both companies will use the same wharf instead of having different wharves as last year. This arrangement will make daily sailings to St. John from the old Star Line Wharf. Ewart Atkinson has accepted

PETITION FOR
M. TENNANT FOR
MAGISTRATE

Citizens are Signing in Large Numbers
---Petition Will be Presented to Provincial Government at Meeting Next Week

When the provincial government meets here upon Tuesday next, May 5, it will have before it a petition from residents of Fredericton praying that Matthew Tennant of this city be appointed to the office of police magistrate of this city. The petition is now being circulated about the city and is being largely signed. Its circulation will be continued this week and it is expected that several hundreds of names will be on the petition when it is presented.

Police Magistrate Marsh will not vacate the office until his successor is appointed, although his resignation is to go into effect May 1. It will be necessary for him to take several days after the end of the present month to make his returns to the government and to clean up the business of his office.

There is keen public interest displayed in the matter of the appointment of his successor and the action of the government is being awaited eagerly. Mr. Tennant now has the endorsement of the City Council.

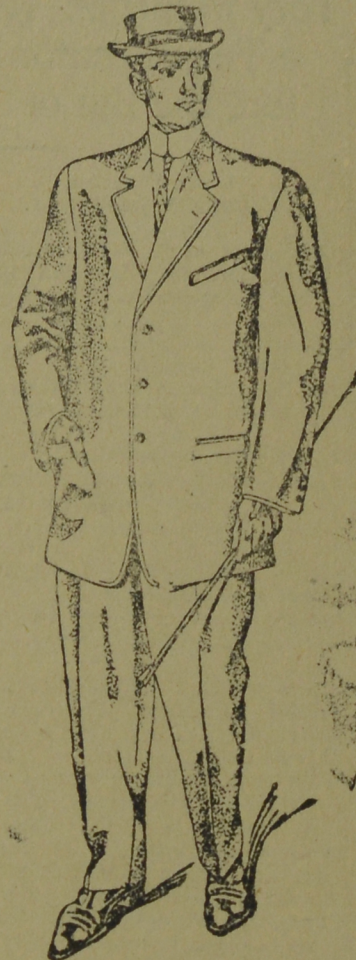

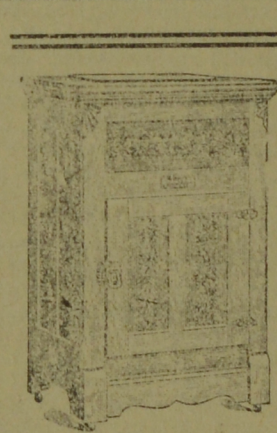
