cle." And notice how his resolution is endorsed by a large number of organizations, and how in Alabama he is listened to by immense audiences.

The Masonic Grand Lodge of Arkansas resolved to make the signing of a petition for the granting of saloon licenses, a Masonic offense.

The Governor of Florida, officially sets aside a Purity and Temperance Day asking its observance by Ministers in all churches in the State. And so one might go on.

The example of Maine is being followed by one State after another, until now, one-sixth of the Republic's population—three millions of her people—are blessed by the same good law, that has emptied her prisons, penitentiaries, etc., to so great an extent.

God grant that our little Prince Edward Island may soon shame the rest of this Dominion into following her example.

In Europe the work has made greater progress than on this side of the Atlantic.

In France the Government makes a patriotic appeal for the future of the nation, employing this language in municipal posters against "Alcoholism which means the chronic poisoning that results from habitual use of wine, beer, or spirits even to an extent that would not produce drunkards." One hundred British cities, also make such appeals in this way.

The German Emperor is asking students, workmen, and soldiers to take the pledge of total abstinence. He tells his students that in the twenty-three years that he has governed, he knows from the documents passing through his hands how much crime is due to alcohol.

In Denmark there is a state wide campaign for prohibition. The Government of Sweden is seriously contemplating the introduction of a national prohibitory law. With the Swedish King, a strong temperance advocate and his Prime Minister in a public speech declaring his belief that "Prohibition is the only effective means for preventing drunkenness" the prospect there is rosy as the dawn.

In Norway a large majority of the parliamentary members are total abstainers and so it comes easy for them to favor the total prohibition of alcohol.

In Italy too, the Government is awakening to the need of putting on brakes because of the marked increase of insanity and crime.

In Scotland, Ireland and even in England, without any increase in the consumption of spirits, there is a decided falling off in the consumption of beer. Lack of time, but not of material compels a halt, yet, we must take time to mention the stirring of the Opium Plague in China.

In 1903 the Emperor Dowager issued an edict, that the poppy cultivation should be decreased one-tenth each year for the next ten years. Forty percent of the whole population consumed Opium. In the Province containing the largest poppy producing area in China certain farmers said that most of the others had quit planting the poppy, and thinking that the drug would be in demand, planted large fields, which the viceroy promptly sent his lackey to dig up, and the next year they planted their fields again, and again the viceroy destroyed them. Once more they planted their fields. The viceroy said to his officials "This is not simply disobedience, this is rebellion" and sending forth his executioners he dug their graves in their poppy fields on the edge of which he had them kneel, and with his axe he crumpled off their heads and tumbled their bodies into their graves. No wonder that the Chinese are making such remarkable progress in ridding their country of that curse.

The punishment accorded may seem very cruel, but if such drastic measures were taken to end the rum traffic what awful tragedies—immensurable eclipses—these, in awfulness had been prevented by men in authority in this and other so-called Christian Islands. In Nova Scotia, Halifax, the capital Nova Scotia, Halifax, the capital is the only place left, in the Province where rum is legalized. In New Brunswick nine out of the fifteen counties, York being one of them have prohibition laws. In the capital of this Province such laws have long existed. Have they been enforced? Alas, no! That they have been unblushingly broken, is no secret.

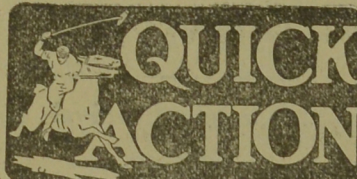
