SAYS KITCHENER OUSTED CABINET

New York, Sept. 23.—The failure of the Military Governor of Lille to give reinforcements to the British forces at a time when they were in danger of annihilation during the battle of Mons and the resultant protest of Lord Kitchener Great Britain's Secretary for War, made to President Poincaré of the French Cabinet, according to brought about the recent resignation of Dr. Fred S. Mason, of New York, who arrived here today on the Olympic.

Dr. Mason while in France was allowed to visit the hospital at Camp Mariborough, Boulogne-sur-Mer, by Surgeon General Linden Bell of the British expeditionary force. He also visited other hospitals prepared for the wounded at Boulogne, Trouville

and Harve At. Boulogne Gen. Bull introduced him to a well-informed official of rank.

The following is a report of the facts as the official is said to have stated them to Dr. Mason:

"When a force of about 100,000 British under Gen. French were opposed by more than twice that number of Germans of General Von Kluck's army at Mons, Gen. French saw that he was in a desperate situation. After the first day of fighting when it was seen that the overwhelming force of Germans threatened to surround the entire British expeditionary force, Gen. French made an earnest appeal to Gen. Joffre, commander of the French troops requesting support on the left wing, where the British were entirely alone.

"Gen. Joffre wired instructions to the Governor of Lille to send his garrison of 40,000 men to support the British forces.

"It appears, however that the Governor put the telegram in his pocket for 48 hours, in order, he said to al-

WOULD EXPEL BOURASSA FROM THE CANADIAN CLUB

Montreal Sept. 25.—One thousand members of the Canadian Club at their luncheon yesterday afternoon in the Windsor Hotel cheered vociferously at a motion to expel Mr. Henri Bourassa, the National leader from the Club on account of his anti-British sentiments expressed in his paper Le Devoir.

Although the motion was not carried owing to its being declared out of order by the president, Dean Adam on a technicality alone, it was plain that the resolution represented the feeling of the majority of the members.

Mr. Lansing Lewis proposed the resolution which read as follows:—

"That this club regrets to feel that the spirit which prompted it to extend the honor of its membership to Henri Bourassa, one of the most eloquent of our French-Canadian orators, does not seem to have been either understood or appreciated by him, and that the club now feels in justice to those of our French and English fellow-members who believe in a united Canada, and who are loyally giving their time, their money and the lives in the service of their King and country, that the treasurer should return Mr. Bourassa his fee expressing the hope that he will live long enough to realize what it means to be a true patriot and honored citizen."

The motion was cheered wildly by the crowd—both English and French members rising in their seats to give expression of their feelings.

Then, when the cheering had subsided, Mr. A. R. McMaster, K.C. looking white and feeling the tension, declared:

"It is a principle of British justice that no one should be condemned unheard. This resolution has been sprung upon the meeting. It is out of order and I ask it so to be declared."

Dean Adams—"I was unaware that such a motion was to be brought before the meeting. It is out of order. The meeting has expressed itself quite strongly in one sense. I think that perhaps they might further refer this matter to the executive."

The incident was then closed, and the club proceeded to welcome the Belgian delegates.

RHEIMS CATHEDRAL WAS WORLD'S BEST

If the reported destruction of Cathedral Rheims is true, it is the greatest loss from an historical and artistic sense of the present war. Begun on the site of an earlier church erected by Robert DeCourcy in 1212, and continued at intervals down to the 15th century, it has been described as "the most perfect in grandeur and grace of gothic style in existence."

The west front which was begun about 1241-42, is said to be the most beautiful structure produced during the Middle Ages, with its deeply recessed triple portal and the wonderful rose window that surrounds it. This window, more than 40 feet in diameter was reported in cable dispatches yesterday as having been destroyed by a shell.

It was in the Cathedral of Rheims successive Kings of France from Philip II to Charles X were crowned and it was there that the Maid of Orleans after her victorious career, stood, banner in hand, before the great altar and saw the coronation of Charles VII, which marked the fulfilment of her vision. After kneeling before the monarch whom she had placed on the throne, "she begged the gentle king to allow her to

low, the women and children to evacuate Lille, and this nearly brought about a defeat of the Allies, and was certainly one of the main reasons why they were obliged to retreat toward Paris.

LORD KITCHENER'S TRIP.

"The British managed to cut their way out of the German trap by almost superhuman effort and at tremendous loss. They were in full retreat away from Mons, when the reinforcements arrived.

"Although Col. French made casual mention of the alleged failure of the French forces to assist him in his official report designed for publication, he sent a complete report and a bitter complaint to Lord Kitchener saying that the failure of the French to answer his plea put his whole army in jeopardy.

"Lord Kitchener was furious. He made a secret trip to Paris and laid his complaint against the dilatory Governor of Lille before President Poincaré and the French Minister of War. The latter, who was a friend of the General complained against, refused to punish him.

"President Poincaré, however to make every concession to Lord Kitchener, forced to resignation of his whole cabinet. This was on Aug. 28. A very serious crisis in the affairs of the Allies was thus avoided and Lord Kitchener triumphed in his demand. The Governor of Lille has been sent to an obscure post of duty."


return to her flocks."

The elaborate richness of the sculpture, its stained glass and statuary are not surpassed in any existing structure. The north transept over the sacristy is a clock said to have been the oldest moping piece of horology in existence. Among the priceless Cathedral treasures were some wonderful church plates of the earlier centuries; reliquaries a thorn of the holy crown, the skull of St. Remy and countless tapestries, some dating from the 15th century.

In a chapel attached to the vestry is a rare collection of Roman and medieval sculpture, including the famous Sarcophagus of Jovinus, the Roman prefect of Rheims who was converted to Christianity in 366.

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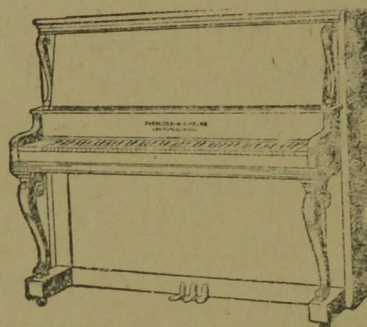
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
