SIR JAMES WHITNEY

In the death of Sir James P. Whitney, which occurred at Toronto on Friday, a great political leader and gifted statesman is lost to Cmtario and to Canada. Early last winter, while visiting in New York, Sir James was stricken with a severe illness and for weeks his life hung by a thread. He recovered sufficiently to return home, but was unable to participate actively in the work of the session of the legislature which followed. The legislature was dissolved in the month of June and Sir James once more led his party to victory, although the state of his health did not permit him to actively engage in the work of the election. Once during the campaign he appeared on the public platform in a great meeting in Toronto and delivered a speech in which he referred in pathetic terms to his long illness and to the expressions of sympathy which came from people of all shades of politics. Sir James entered public

life in 1886 as a member of the On tario legislature and continued a member of that body until the time of his death. 


