ALLIES ARE STEADILY GAINING GROUND

and the troops in the field are suffering from cold.

NEARLY CUT OFF

London, Sept. 26—It is believed rail communication between Przemyśl and Crasow has been interrupted by the Russian advance. An official announcement of the General Staff at Petrograd yesterday declared that on Sept. 19, the Czar's troops, had occupied the towns of Staromasto, Przeworsk and Lancut, north and west of Jaroslau, and that two days later the latter city was carried by storm with loss to the Austrians of twenty cannon and many men.

The occupation of Przeworsk, which is about ten miles west of Jaroslau gave the Russians command of one of the railroads west of Przemyśl, and the fall of Jaroslau clinched their hold. The remaining railroad, which passes through Chyrow, 24 miles distant, is also unofficially reported in Russian hands.

A despatch to the Express from Warsaw says that the Russian successes in Galicia are due partly to the refusal of the Austrian Poles to fight against the Russians.

Great quantities of arms and ammunition the despatch says, were voluntarily handed over to the Russians by the Austrian Polish regiments.

NOT SO MANY

London, Sept. 25—The Central News Agency has received the following despatch from Rome.

"A message from Berlin says the general staff, having agreed to the complete official list of prisoners, has found it necessary to admit that the totals already announced were erroneous. The aggregate number of prisoners in German hands is now reduced from 250,000 to 50,000 of which 30,000 are Russians."

REINFORCEMENTS BY RAIL

London, Sept. 25—German troops are being transported into France over the railway line between Muncien-Gladbach and Aix La Chapelle, according to the Amsterdam correspondent of Reuter's Telegram Company, who says this fact is stated in a telegram from Maastricht.

23 OFFICERS KILLED

London, Sept. 25—Telegraphing from Amsterdam the correspondent of the Reuter Telegram Company says the thirty first German casualty list carrying a total of about on thousand men killed, wounded and missing, has been given out. It includes the names of twenty three officers of one regiment who were killed in five days' fighting.

BRITISH HEROISM.

Montreal, Sept. 25—Some stirring tales of British heroism on the battle fields of France are related in the port by the seamen who have come with their vessels from over the Atlantic. On land and sea the finest traditions of the British army and navy have been upheld, and pages more glorious than any earlier ones have been added to the history of the nation.

One officer declares that a British submarine has penetrated into Kiel Harbor and fired two torpedoes at the German warship tucked away in their retreat. The shots were unsuccessful. Then the enemy went after the submarine. The craft sank to the bottom to escape and had to remain submerged so long that when it reached its base again five of the crew had been suffocated by the fumes within the hull.

Every officer and man on the vessels in port swears that a Russian army passed through the British Isles on its way to France—in spite of the assertion of the War Office that the Czar's soldiers never set foot on British shores. One officer asserts that his wife saw one trainload, while another claims that he saw six trainloads of the Russians on their way to the front through England.

NEW LOUVAIN CHARGE.

London, Sept. 25—The third section of the report of the Belgian Commission appointed to inquire into alleged breaches of international law by the Germans have been received in London. It supplements previous reports which were given out by the Official Information Bureau here on Aug. 26 and Sept. 16.

Today's report refutes the German suggestion that the inhabitants of Louvain brought on the destruction of the town by firing on the Germans. It follows in part:

"The inhabitants of Louvain took no part in the fighting. Moreover, the destruction of the town came at a time when the last Belgian troops had evacuated the district 11 days before. Witnesses declare that the first shots were fired by intoxicated German soldiers at their own officers. Another fact established follows:

"A crowd of from 5000 to 6000 men, women and children were taken by the 162nd Regiment of German infantry on Aug. 28 to the Louvain Riding School where they spent the night. The place of confinement was so small that all had to remain standing. The sufferings were so great that several children died in their mothers' arms and a number of women lost their reason."

"A large number of places in the triangle formed by Vilvorde, Malines and Louvain have been given over to plunder and partially destroyed by fire, the population dispersed and inhabitants indiscriminately arrested and shot without trial, the reason being to inspire terror and compel migration."

"This was notably the case in Samst, Weerde, Elewytt, Holstade, Wesselaer, Wilsela, Bueken, Eppenheim, Warchter, Thiridonck, Boortmeerbeek, Houthem and Tremeloo. In all these villages women who were unable to escape were exposed to the brutal instincts of the German soldiers."

"We are convinced that an international inquiry like that conducted in the Balkans by the Carnegie Commission would establish the truth of our assertions."

Paris, Sept. 25—A despatch to the Italian newspaper Messagero, forwarded to Paris by the Rome correspondent of the Havas Agency, says that the allied forces have landed in Dalmatia after bombarding the fortified harbor of Lissa. The British and French flags were then hoisted to provoke the Austrian fleet to come out and engage the allied fleet in battle.

Three Austrian squadrons, the correspondent adds, are sheltered in a canal at Fasana, opposite the Austrian naval station of Zola.

AIRSHIP DROPS BOMBS.

London, Sept. 25—A despatch to Reuter's Telegram Company from Boulogne says:

"About mid-day a German aeroplane flew over Boulogne at a great height and the aviator threw a bomb into a shipbuilding yard. No one was injured and slight damage was done. The aeroplane continued its flight in a southerly direction."

There's always an open door.

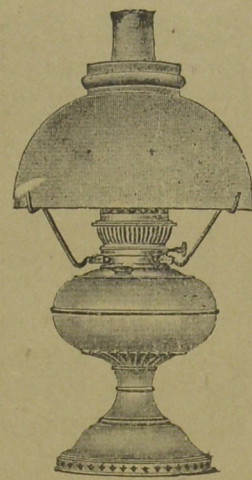

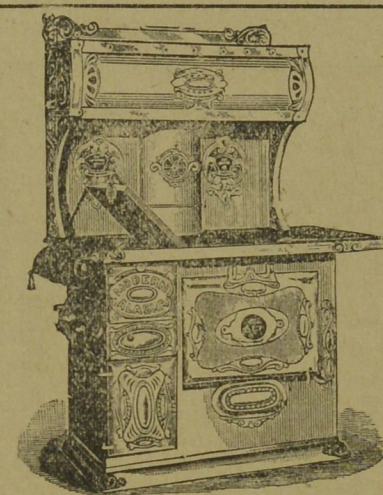
