SUBSCRIPTIONS HAVE PASSED TEN THOUSAND MARK

Magnificent Response made by the Citizens of Fredericton to Appeal For Funds--Expected That \$15,000 Will be Raised

The subscriptions to the local branch of the Canadian Patriotic Fund have now reached \$10,107.20, and it is expected that as soon as the house to house canvass is completed, it will reach the \$15,000 mark. Arrangements have been completed for the house to house canvass of the entire city and this afternoon a committee of ladies from the Daughters of the Empire commenced the work of soliciting contributions. It is altogether likely that other committees from the different women's organizations will start work on Monday.

At the Market Square this morning a hat rack, which had been donated to the fund by Mr. A. Turner Howard, an employee of the Chestnut Canoe Company, was auctioned off by Mr. E. H. Allen for the sum of \$18.50. Mr. C. H. Thomas bid in the rack for \$14.50 and gave it to the fund to be sold again. At the second sale it was sold to Mr. Samuel Campbell for \$4.

The report of the finance committee shows that the proceeds from the horse races at the Trotting Park on Thursday afternoon amounted to \$322. Over six hundred tickets were sold for fifty cents each and there were some minor receipts from the sale of score cards, while there were no expenses.

POLICE MADE RAID ON A RIVER STEAMER

Seizure of Liquor Made Yesterday on the D. J. Purdy--Information to be Laid

The police made a Scott Act raid on the steamer D. J. Purdy on her arrival from St. John about six o'clock last evening and seized a large quantity of liquor which was consigned to an uptown druggist and several prominent citizens.

Sergeant William Duncan and City Detective James Roberts pulled off the raid and they apparently had been tipped off that the liquor was en route here for they had a truck wagon at the boat landing waiting for the arrival of the steamer.

Seven barrels of bottled ale and porter, a sixty gallon cask of ale and twenty four gallons of brandy was found on board the steamer, and it is likely that a complaint will be laid against the Crystal Steamship Company for carrying liquor into a Scott Act county.

The parties to whom the liquor was consigned will likely be arraigned before Magistrate Limerick in the police court early next week.

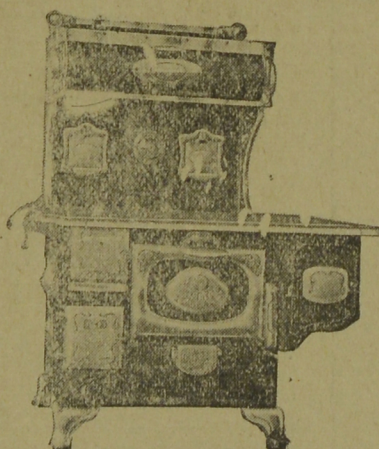

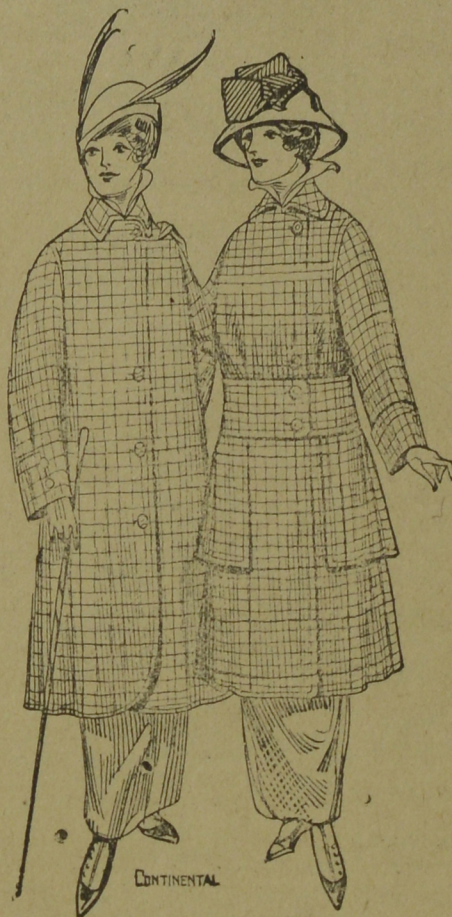

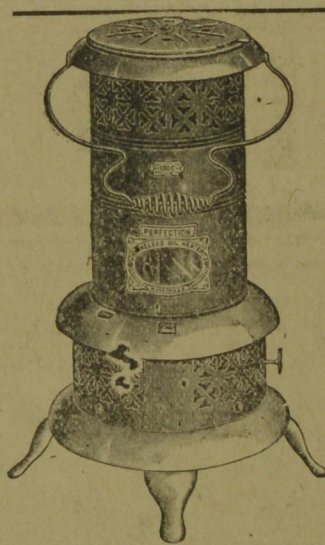
