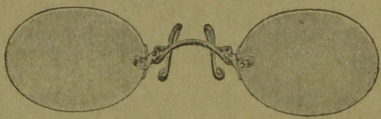
Major A. B. Snow has been assigned to the command of the troops at the barracks and officers of the 71st Regt. are to act as orderly officers each day.

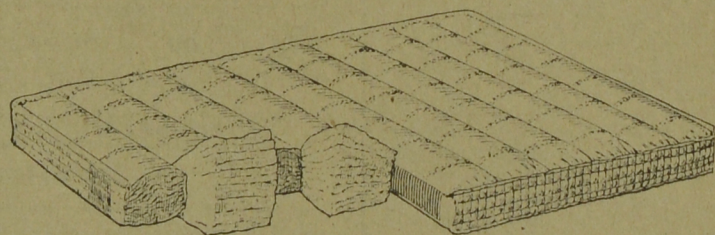
