

Who Would be an Editor?

New regulations for the control of the Press have been issued by the Chinese Government. Editors and publishers are required to submit a record of their past to the police be fore they can obtain permission to publish. This rule, in effect, gives power to the police to refuse a license to anyone who has been connected with political propaganda.

Publishers in Peking must deposit with the police \$150 for a daily news paper, \$125 for a weekly, \$75 for a monthly, and \$50 for an annual, and the rates are doubled for publications outside Peking. No person under thirty can be the editor, publisher or printer of a newspaper, and no per son having a nervous disease can an editor.


