### MRS. A. M. SHERMAN PASSED AWAY IN MONTREAL HOSPITAL

Well Known Fredericton Lady Passed Away on Sunday After a Lingering illness--Was the Mother of a Gifted Family

The sad news was received yesterday of the death in Montreal of Mrs. Alice Maxwell Sherman of this city. She had been in failing health for some months and about ten days ago went to Montreal and underwent an operation in a hospital in that city. The first news received was of an encouraging nature and while it was known that her condition was serious friends and relatives were scarcely prepared for the news of her death, and it was a grievous shock to them. The deceased lady was a daughter of the late Mr. Joseph Myhrall of this city and was in her seventieth year. She is survived by a family of three daughters and three sons, viz: Frank J. Sherman, assistant general manager of the Royal Bank; Miss Myra Sherman of the city teaching staff, Laurie W. Sherman of the Royal Bank staff, London, England; Mrs. D. E. Burpee of Penticton, B.C.; Miss Stella Sherman, at home, and Rev. L. Ralph Sherman, a Rhodes Scholar now of London. Miss Mary K. Tibbitts, the first lady graduate of the U.N.B., is a niece of the deceased.

The late Mrs. Sherman had been prominent in social circles for years and had many warm friends in the community. She was possessed of a kindly heart and had many excellent qualities which endeared her to her family and friends. She was very proud of her family and probably no woman in this province ever had more reason to be. 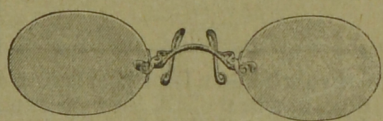
