DISCUSSED BY  
SECRETARY CROWEProposes New Body to Deal With That  
Matter---Reinstatement Should  
be Made at Annual Meeting

Secretary Crowe of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada, at the recent annual meeting of the body, made the following pointed remarks about reinstatement:

"A plan was given for consideration that was evolved for the purpose of overcoming a great obstacle in the advancement of amateur sport. It is in brief, a national committee or amateur standing composed of one member nominated by every recognized Canadian amateur governing body or class of sport played in the Dominion, such committee to be the only body having power to reinstate athletes whose offences have been against the amateur law; that is, athletes defined in this clause 'B' of the amateur definition of this union. One of the greatest detriments to the proper and consistent governance of amateur sport is the authority to reinstate assumed by or given to various governing bodies. Continually throughout the year have cases been brought to our notice of one governing body reinstating an athlete for competition in their ranks and another kind of governing body refusing to accept such reinstatement. Different branches of the union have refused to accept for competition in their territory men who have been reinstated by recognized governing bodies. This inconsistency in the interpretation and operation of the amateur law must sooner or later be stopped. If the union and its branches are to command the respect of the athletic world the promiscuous whitewashing of athletes, to suit local interests, by committees clothed in brief authority, must not be tolerated. There must be no give and take policy and if a man deliberately offends against the amateur laws in one sport he must be promptly barred from all other amateur sport and such an offender must understand that he cannot secure reinstatement for the next season's sport after having been kicked out of the last.

"The proposed committee could very easily meet on the same day as the annual meeting of this union and should reinstate only at their annual meeting. Most decidedly it must not be easy for a deliberate offender against the amateur laws to secure requalification.

"The representatives of the Dominion of Canada Football Association were under the impression that by their articles of affiliation they would be entitled to play against professional football teams touring this country and still retain their amateur standing. The feeling of the union was made clear in the passage of a resolution setting out that such a competition was a violation of the principles and policy of the union."

## SPORTS OF ALL KINDS

New Glasgow Hockey Club has signed up Gregory, Morrison, Willie, Rattenbury of Charlottetown and are after Scott, Doran and Miller.

The Newark International League team will train at Albany, Ga., next Spring. Last spring they trained in Virginia but the management considered the climate too cold and so decided to go farther south.

Mordecai Brown former pitcher for the Chicago Cubs may officiate as umpire in the American League next season. President Johnson has two vacancies on his staff to fill due to the retirement of Sheridan and Egan.

Jimmy Callahan manager of the Chicago White Sox, seems to have picked up a find in Borton, the young first baseman who finished the season with the Sox. He played in only 31 games but handled himself well and hit at an average of .371. He is only 21 years old.

Charles Murphy president of the Chicago Cubs is angling for Watson the prominent left-handed pitcher of the Minneapolis club of the American Association. An offer of Jerry Downs, Lauderhill, a pitcher and Heckinger, a catcher was refused.

Morris Rath the former Baltimore second baseman now playing that position for the Chicago White Sox was the best at his position in the American League last season. He was far superior to Eddie Collins of the Athletics who topped the list in 1911.

WOLGAST LOST LIGHTWEIGHT  
TITLE TO WILLIE RITCHIEDouble-foul in Sixteenth Round Gave Decision to  
Ritchie--Sailor White Lost to Pelky--Joe Rivers  
Beat Mandot--Battling Nelson Beaten by Cross

Daly City, Calif., Nov. 28--Willie Ritchie of San Francisco became the lightweight champion of the world by defeating Ad Wolgast this afternoon at the Daly City open air arena. Referee Jim Griffin awarding him the decision in the sixteenth round. Wolgast had fouled him twice. The champion had been sent to the floor in this round, Ritchie catching him with a right cross that came as unexpectedly as did the foul blows.

Wolgast tottered about the ring, but the Californian apparently lacked the power to land a finishing punch. Both men were strong at the end of the fifteenth round and each had suffered considerable punishment. Ritchie presenting a battered appearance. One of his eyes was entirely closed and the other partly so. The fight was in Wolgast's favor up to the turning point in the sixteenth round.

## PELKY BESTS SAILOR WHITE

Chicopee, Mass., Nov. 28--Arthur Pelky, the Chicopee "White Hope" won the popular decision over Sailor White, of New York, in a ten round bout here this afternoon.

(Note--Pelky's name is Pelletier. He is a Canadian and claims the heavyweight title of the Dominion.)

## RIVERS BEATS MANDOT

Los Angeles, Nov. 28--Joe Rivers of Los Angeles, won the decision over Joe Mandot of New Orleans, in a twenty-round fight here today. Rivers is now the logical man to meet Willie Ritchie, who won the lightweight championship from Ad Wolgast at San Francisco today.

The first round showed that Rivers was not the same boy that fought Mandot on Labor Day. He almost put the Frenchman through the ropes with a right to the jaw. The second also was Rivers' round. They fought like wildcats in the third round, Mandot doing the most damage.

The fourth round was Rivers' by a shave, he having drawn blood from Mandot's mouth. The fifth was Rivers' round by a good margin. He bored in landing rights and lefts to the jaw. In the sixth, both fighters kept their distance, Mandot landing the greater number of blows. In the seventh Rivers missed a swing and fell, but maintained the offensive. It was his round. Following a tame eighth, the ninth round was rough. The tenth and eleventh were fast and even.

Rivers had the twelfth, thirteenth and fourteenth, all fiercely fought. He had Mandot on the ropes when the fourteenth round ended. Mandot tottered to his corner at the end of the fifteenth. Mandot recuperated somewhat in the sixteenth, but re-

mained on the defensive in the seventeenth. Rivers hammered Mandot in the eighteenth. Mandot took punishment in the nineteenth and twentieth but was not outclassed.

## CROSS DEFEATS NELSON

New York, Nov. 28--Leach Cross outpointed "Battling" Nelson in a ten-round bout here today. Nelson took a great deal of punishment but was forcing the fighting at the finish. Cross weighed 138 pounds at the ring side and Nelson four ounces heavier.

Cross started in with left jabs to the face and sent right and left hooks in quick succession to the head. Nelson was outclassed but managed to land hard on the jaw with right and left and had Cross crouching at the end of the first round.

Cross jumped out of the ring after hailing hands with Nelson, but the latter remained in the centre of the ring until the cheers which greeted him subsided. Holding up his right glove for a hearing Nelson shouted: "Despite all that has been said of my poor condition I am glad I got this opportunity of showing you all how feeble I am in getting up against one of the best men you have got here. I thank you."

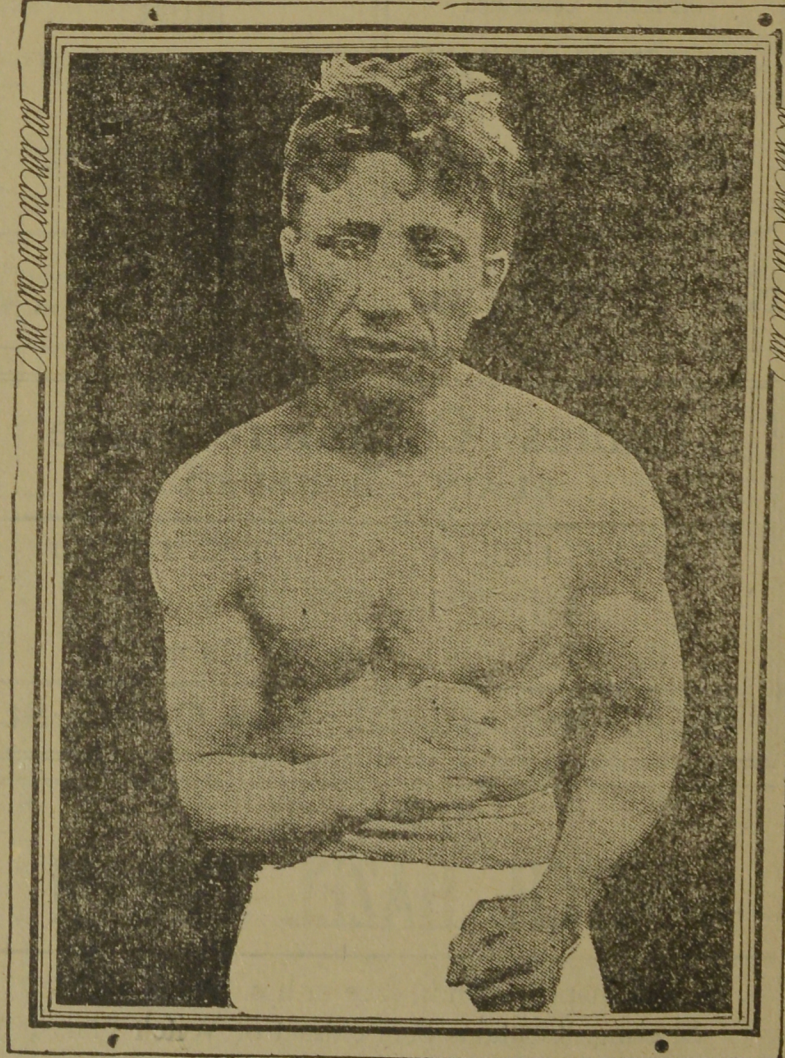
In order to put an end to a continuous performance of baseless rumors, T. G. Davis, secretary of the New York Americans, sent out the following interview with President Farrell of that club:
