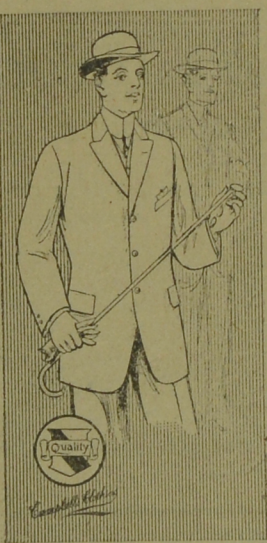

FEDERAL GAME OUTDREW NATIONAL AT CHICAGO

New Organization Proving Very Popular
---Independents Have Very Strong
Support Among Fans

Chicago, May 4—In the first real test of popularity between organized baseball and the Federal League here Sunday, the independent organization won easily by a score of two to one or better. The Chicago Nationals, playing St. Louis, drew an attendance estimated at seven thousand, while the Federals, with Pittsburgh as opponents, to easily fifteen thousand persons. Conditions were ideal for baseball and two home teams both in the second division were facing tail-end opponents.

A week ago Sunday, with cold weather, the Cubs played Pittsburgh, the League leaders and drew twelve thousand. The Federals playing Kansas City, away down in percentage, had twenty thousand. The Cubs opened to seven thousand while while twenty-five thousands witnessed the first game of the Chifeds.

In the initial contests today Duluth lined up against the champions of last year at Winona, Superior appeared at Moorhead, Fargo, Virginia at Grand Forks and Fort William at Kinnipeg.

ATHLETICS LET FOUR RECRUITS GO TO MINORS

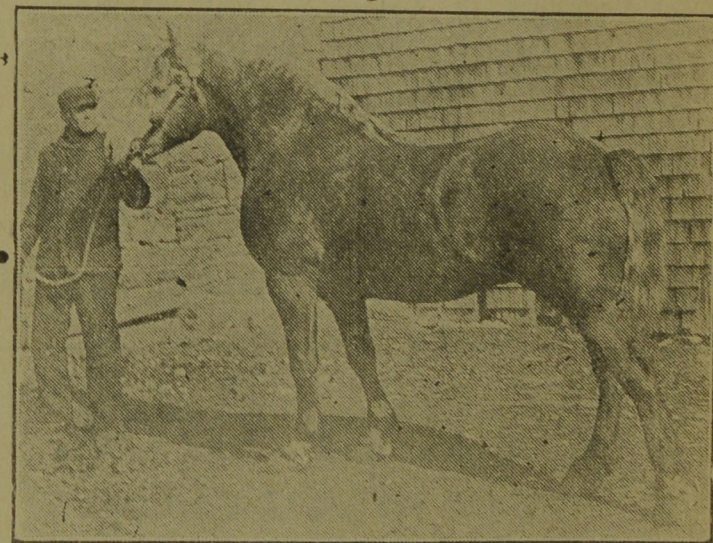
